Bloody Battle in East Africa

London, April 28.—an engagement in East Africa which for bloodiness, considering the numbers engaged, surpassed even the fighting on Hill 60 in Belgium, is mentioned briefly in a War Office communique issued by the General Press Bureau.

A force of 300 Indian troops, holding the British post at Jassin, was attacked by 2,000 Germans, and surrendered the post only after the ammunition had been exhausted and only about twenty of the defenders remained. The commander of the force being among the slain.

The official statement covers the operations in the British East Africa protectorate between November and March, and says:—

"An attempt by Indian and British troops in Tanganyika German East Africa was unsuccessful, and the force re-embarked and proceeded to Mombasa. Simultaneously an attack on a German outpost at Longido resulted in the Germans evacuating their position after suffering heavy losses. The British also drove the Germans out of British territory across the Umba River.

"The British post at Jassin, held by 300 Indians, was attacked by 2,000 Germans. Jassin was surrendered after its ammunition had been expended and the commander and 280 men had been killed.

"An expedition sent from Mombasa occupied the German island of Mafa, the German garrison surrendering unconditionally.

"Shirati, on Lake Victoria Nyanza, was attacked and occupied by the British. The German armed steamer Muanza was driven ashore and disabled. Subsequent fighting at Shirati resulted in the Germans being defeated and retreating in disorder."

Russian Troops for Turkish Soil

Petrograd, April 28.—Russian expeditionary forces are to aid the western allies in their campaign against Constantinople. Troops are being concentrated at Odessa, whence they will be taken to the eastern coast of Turkey to effect a landing under the direction of the Russian fleet.

Emperor Nicholas has gone to Odessa to review these troops before their departure. Announcement was made to-day that the Russian fleet had arrived at Odessa, and it is believed the expedition will sail within a few days.

Russian transports and Black Sea steamers have been assembled at Odessa to convey the troops to Turkey.

"The recent bombardment of the Bosphorus forts was expeditious to-day as a move to prevent the egress of the Turkish fleet into the Black Sea.

The Ottoman warships were driven back towards Constantinople under the fire directed against the Bosphorus and Russian torpedo boats are lying off the Straits to attack any warships that emerge. It is declared that the admiralty that the Turkish fleet has been completely bottled up.

In the meantime three flotillas of Russian torpedo boats are scouring the Black Sea in search for merchant ships. A despatch from Odessa states that during the operations of last week off the Anatolian coast 23 Turkish ships were sunk by the destroyers. Five of these were steamers.

To weaken Turkey further and prevent troops being sent from the Caucasus front to aid the Ottoman forces in Europe, the Russians have opened a sharp offensive in the Caucasus.

DEMANDS MUCH OFFERS LITTLE

London, April 29.—Telegraphing from Sofia, the Daily Mail's correspondent says: "The Greek Government, which a short time ago refused the invitation of the Entente Powers to join the war, has now approached them with a proposal for Greece's definite co-operation. The Allied powers, however, are not now so eager, especially as Greece demands much and offers little. The Entente Powers reply was that unless Greece made more definite and satisfactory proposals negotiations with her would be impossible."
