## FURIOUS TORNADO

### Works Death and Destruction

### Hundred Persons Killed and One Hundred and Fifty Injured.

Special to the Daily Nugget, Gainesville, Ga., June 3.—A terrible storm killed 100 persons and wounded 150, levelled 100 cottages and blew two stories off a cotton factory. It was the most destructive storm that has visited the state in years.

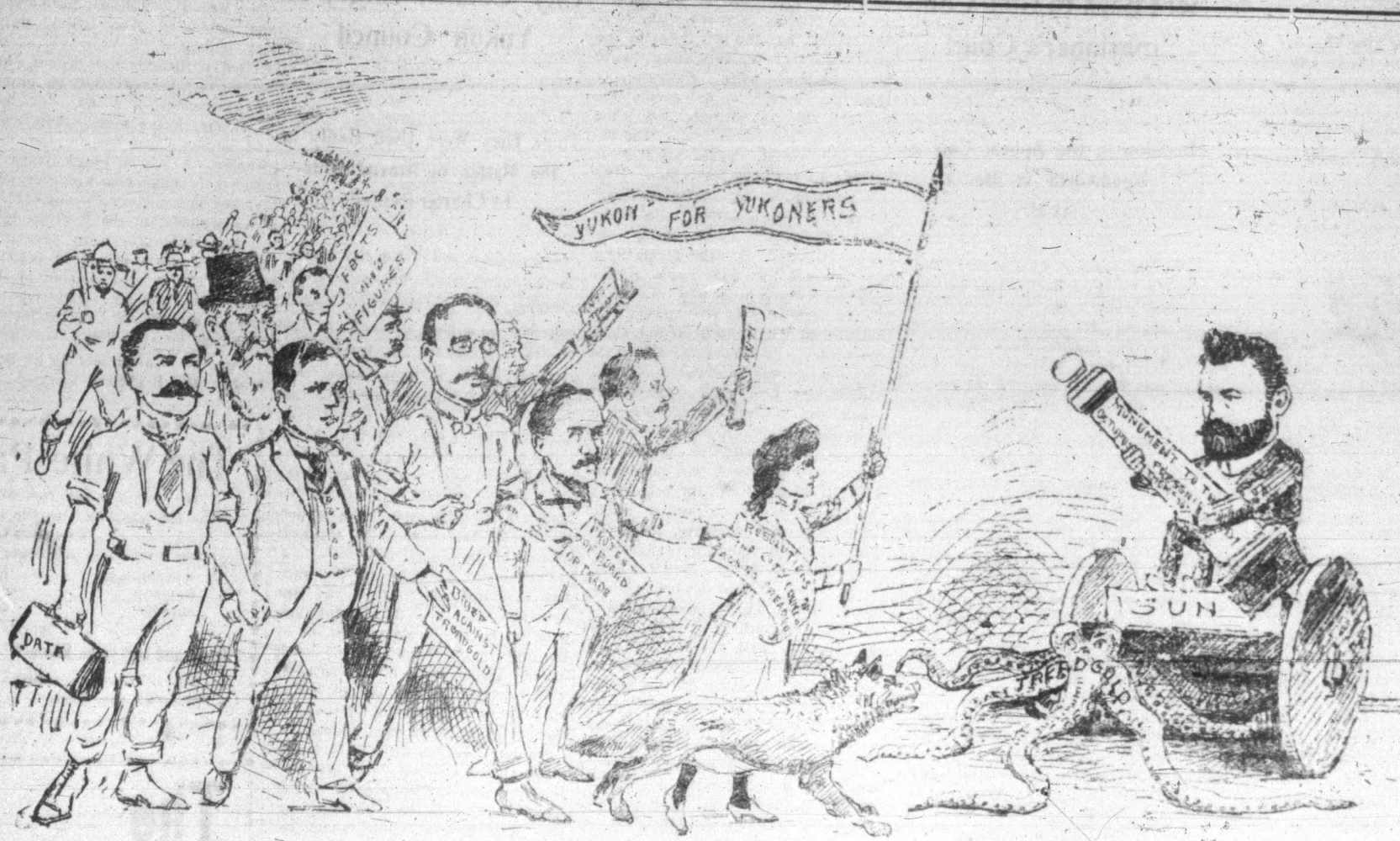

## LA FRANCE-THISTLE

Former Going to Stewart, Latter to Whitehorse

The steamer La France returned at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon, having made a very successful trip. On the way down she went near the mouth of Thistle and took aboard the freight of the late W. B. Coppinger. The steamer brought down six passengers from Duncan and one from Yukon Crossing. The La France will again sail for Stewart river points Friday night at 8 o'clock.

The Thistle, which went up Stewart last night, will be dispatched to Whitehorse Saturday night at 10 o'clock.

## TICKET AGENT J. W. YOUNG

Of White Pass Company Arrives

Describes Hardships of Getting Mail Around Lake Lebarge.

Mr. J. Wesley Young arrived in the mail canoe from Whitehorse this forenoon to resume his position as ticket agent for the White Pass Company.

He reports a hard trip as the mail had to be carried around Lake Lebarge by a pack train of eight horses and as the trail used last season is now much blockaded by windfalls the trip was anything but a pleasant one. In fact, Mr. Young says that during the two days required in getting around the lake he never in his life worked harder or encountered more difficulties.

The lake when Mr. Young started around it one week ago today was too soft for travel by dogs or pedestrians and in his opinion it can not now be long in breaking up. He believes it will be open to navigation by the 10th or 12th.

The trip was made from Lower Lebarge to Dawson in 5 days almost continuous travel, no stops being made at night. The result was that the party was pretty badly used up when Dawson was reached today.

Mr. Young says that never in the history of the country has the water in the upper Yukon, above the mouth of the Pelly, and the Thirty mile been so low as at present. But as there was the usual fall of snow in the hills around the headwaters he expects a rise in the river very soon.

The country between Selwyn and Coffee creek Mr. Young describes as a paradise for hunters of big game, and his party having seen no less than five bears in one afternoon and all on the same side of the river. But as they had not lost any bears they did not delay the royal mail by going after them.

Professor Ross, superintendent of schools for the territory, would be glad if the parents of all children eligible to attend the public kindergarten who are not at present doing so would communicate with Miss Wilson, teacher of that department. More pupils than are now attending can be accommodated and it is also desired to learn the probable number of children who will be here for next season. School in the fall will begin August 17.

## EXODUS TO NOME HAS BEGUN

Special to the Daily Nugget, Seattle, June 3.—The 1903 exodus for Nome set in yesterday. One thousand people took passage on the steamships Senator, Oregon and Jeanie. The Empire Transportation Co.'s steamship Ohio and the Northwestern Commercial Co.'s Centennial will sail today.

On the latter, J. Warren Dickson is the heaviest shipper. He is head of the Western Alaska Construction Co., which is building a railroad from the mouth of Solomon river to Council City.

On the Centennial, Eureka and Aztec, all operated by the Northwestern Commercial Co., he is taking 6,000 tons of steel rails, ties, lumber, construction materials and miners' supplies.

The Jeanie's main hurricane deck is piled high with cargo. Of her total freight the Desoto Mining Co. had over one thousand tons.

## STREET GRADING

Work is Being Done by the City Government

The city government now has a gang of men and several teams busy at street grading in various portions of the city. Yesterday some work was being done at the south end near the road around the Klondike bluff.

Today the teams are working on Seventh avenue, and other sections of the city will be visited in due course of time. Under the supervision of city foreman Dan McLennan necessary repairs to the streets are being made rapidly and economically.

The city is not going into the grading business extensively on account of lack of funds, but such work as is within the means of the finances is being undertaken.

The cribbing near the Klondike bluff is holding better than was anticipated and no fears are now felt that it will be washed out.

The cribbing rests on heavy timbers set well into the gravel and will withstand considerable hard usage.

**Mail Arrives**  
At 11:40 o'clock today a canoe arrived from up river with 710 pounds of first-class mail. The arrival of the mail dispelled all fears due to the fact that it had been reported as not having reached Stewart 24 hours after passing Selwyn. It reached and passed Stewart yesterday at 4:40 p. m. but the fact was not known to the telegraph operator whose office is on the opposite side of the river from the landing. The mail came from Ogilvie after 5 o'clock this morning.

## CAUSED BY A MULE

### Three Large Mines Are Closed

Company Refused to Reinstatement Man Who Whipped a Balky Animal.

Special to the Daily Nugget, Linton, Ind., June 3.—"Dan," a kicking mule at the Black Creek mine near Linton was the indirect cause of three large mines closing down and six hundred men going on strike. The miners have lost \$19,000 in wages and the mines have failed to get out 30,000 tons of coal. Durrough, an employe, was discharged for mule whipping and the union demanded his reinstatement which was refused. The men struck May 14 and are still out.
