At the meeting of the city council last evening Ald. McDonald raised the question as to the right of medical men to enter the schools as they did and vaccinate children lined up in a row like cattle, without the knowledge or consent of the parents. The children in the kindergarten had fainted during the operation and one of the doctors had acted very ungentlemanly when approached by Ald. McDonald during the operation. It was thought that legal action could be taken against the medical men for assault.

She was 81 years of age. Deceased and her husband were among the early settlers and they were held in high esteem.

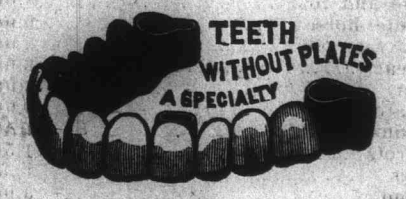
