The Regina friends of John R. Marshall will sympathize with him in the death of Mrs. Marshall which took place at St. Catherine's, Ont., on Friday last. Deceased had been ailing for some time, and had postponed a trip to Scotland last summer, but went east for treatment. The news of her death came as a great shock to her husband and friends. Mr. and Mrs. Marshall came to Regina eighteen years ago and have been actively connected with the life of the city. Mrs. Marshall took an active interest in church work being a member of Knox church. She was one of the first members of the Regina Victoria Hospital. Mrs. Mar-

shall wrote considerable in Scotch dialect under the pen name of "Sandy Grant," her contributions being both in verse and prose. Deceased was born at Selkirk, Scotland, Feb. 28, 1848, and was the daughter of James Henderson, coming to Canada at the age of seven years. On Feb. 27, 1880 she married John R. Marshall at Chesterfield, Ont., and on leaving Hamilton the train left the rails injuring the bride and groom, both of whom were taken to the hospital where they remained for some weeks. It was shortly after their recovery that they removed to Regina where they have since been amongst our most esteemed citizens.
