He was also a liberal supporter of every good cause, a strict member of the Anglican church, and one who was always to be found whenever religious duties called him there. The funeral on Friday morning was unusually largely attended by his numerous, warm and sympathetic friends who had assembled to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. About ten years ago deceased married Hannah, eldest daughter of the late Sammie Green, who is now left to mourn his loss and to whom we join in extending our sympathy in this her sad hour of bereavement.
