Mt. A. and Acadia Play a Scoreless Draw.

A scoreless draw was the result of the Mount Allison-Acadia football match at Sackville last Thursday, Nov. 9th. A large crowd, including about 120 persons from Acadia, witnessed the game, which was brilliant in spots. N. Relston, formerly of Dalhousie, refereed in a satisfactory manner.

Near the end of the second half Smith, of St. John, had one of his legs broken at ankle, McKean, of Acadia, had his ankle sprained Buckley, of Mt. Allison, was also slightly injured. McAllister, of Mt. Allison, was substituted for Smith, and McKinnon, of Acadia, for McKean.

The whistle was blown at three o'clock, and the ball was rushed into Mount A. territory, where it was kept for the greater part of the first half. In this period there was some nice punting, Reid, the Acadia full-back, showing to advantage. Acadia had the best of the scrim throughout this half. Their heeling was almost perfect and many times had their halves not fumbled no doubt they would have scored. The bright spot of the Acadia team were their quarters who worked like Trojans and much good work was accomplished by them.

The first half ended with the ball in Acadia territory. Score Acadia 0, Mt. Allison 0.

THE SECOND HALF. Dickinson kicked off for Mt. Allison, and the ball was followed very fast and it seemed as if Mt. Allison was determined to score. Their dribbling was a feature during the first part of this period, but Acadia's weight began to tell on the lighter Mt. Allison men and towards the close Acadians were pressing them very hard, the ball being almost continually in the Mt. A. territory during the last ten minutes.

TO BE PLAYED OFF IF TRURO. The game ended with 'no score' by either team, being a draw and will be played off to day at Truro.

The men most prominent in the Acadia team were Reid at Full Back whose punting is nothing short of wonderful. Black and Andrews a quarter were always on the ball, Black being particularly aggressive. In their half line, Grant, G. L. Andrews and Morrison's passing was very fine in the last half. Grant is a good punter, and a very fast half. In the forward line, Pines, and Atkins were very prominent and always in the game. For Mt. Allison, Godfrey, Sears, Milford and Smith played a great game but were not fed enough to score; Dickinson and Buckley, at quarter were good but Buckley, was watched so closely that he could not get the ball back to his halver, Woodman and Parker played a good consistent game in the forwards.
