"LONDON."

LECTURE BY I. E. BILL.

A large number gathered in the vestry of the Sackville Baptist Church on Monday evening last, to listen to a lecture by Mr. Ingram R. Bill, grandson of the late Rev. I. E. Bill, D. D. The youthful speaker, who had spent more than a year in the great British metropolis, gave an interesting and sparkling description of what he saw and heard in that city.

He gave a description of the Parliament buildings and dwell elegantly upon the distinguished statesman who has been entrusted with the care of the great man, Spurgeon's kindness and simplicity of life, and the state of the country. His sermons are full of tenderness and instruction, and already the printed copies of them have reached the surprising weekly circulation of more than half a million. A prolonged stay was made at the historic city of London, the scene of so many of England's bloodiest tragedies. Here are treasured up the relics of seven hundred years, and the observer is permitted to see almost at the same time the monuments of British glory and the ruins of its power.

Mr. Bill has more than ordinary ability as a speaker. He is a short, stout, and well-proportioned man, and his delivery is full of energy and conviction. The impression made by this his first appearance was most favorable.

BURGLARY.

Arrest of the Suspects.

One of the most daring burglaries ever perpetrated in Sackville was committed last Saturday night or Sunday morning, when the plate glass window of the Sackville Bookstore was smashed by persons who entered and stole goods valued at \$200. The thieves were seen running off with the loot, and were followed by a watchman, who was unable to catch them. No one in the vicinity heard the crash, which was probably because the burglars covered the plate glass with a bag which was found in the window, and then affected an entrance with the aid of a heavy stone. During the evening two more persons were seen lurking in the vicinity and soon after the act was discovered, warrants were procured for their arrest and Alexander Davis, colored, and Felix Northrup, both claiming to be from Halifax, were arrested at Amherst where they walked during the day, and locked up. On Monday they were brought to Sackville and examined before Stipendiary Magistrate H. A. Powell.

After a long examination, the accused failed to give satisfactory accounts of themselves while in this vicinity and were remanded to jail until Friday. A strong link in the chain of evidence against them is the finding of a wedge in the snow pile on the N. B. & P. E. I. track where they went the night, an exact counterpart of those found in rickety's after the late burglary there, and also at Moore's. A knife found in Davis's possession has caps in the blade which correspond exactly with marks made on the wedge. They deny ever having seen the wedge in question. Davis has a hard reputation in Amherst. He has been travelling about Sackville fixing umbrellas and many thefts of umbrellas are credited to him.

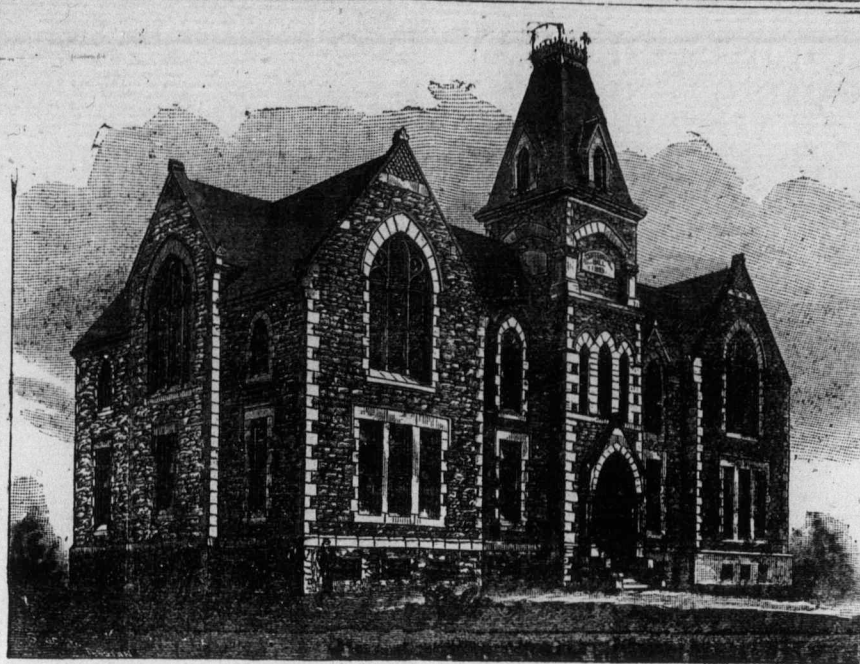
