Water in Food.
The action of water in our food, says a medical writer, is very important. There would be no carrying of food into the system but for the agency of water. Good baruyard manure, if well rotted, can be applied after the crops are planted if it can be secured, and be made of considerable benefit to the growing crops. It is necessary, of course, that it should be made reasonably fine and be spread as evenly as possible over the surface. Cultivating or working with the soil sufficient to keep mellow and destroy the weeds will work the manure into the soil and place it where the feeding roots of the plants can reach it.

This is not the best plan of manuring. When it can be done better results can be secured by hauling out and applying before the crop is planted, harrowing or cultivating so that it will be worked well into the coll manure soil, which was the condition. During the winter season they often suffer many hardships, and are frequently dependent upon the annual grant and the kindness of their white neighbors. It would be difficult to persuade all of them to settle on reserves, yet there are some, who, if
