BARRY, SMITH, HOWARD.
New York Highlanders Buy Three Speedy Young Players From Brockton League Club.

Brockton, June 25—Pres. John W. McCue, of the Brockton New England League baseball team, today announced the sale of the players Barry, Smith and Howard to the New York Highlanders. They will report at the end of the New England League season. Smith is an outfielder and has been with Brockton three seasons. He is one of the fastest men in the league on the bases, in a class by himself as a fielder, and a strong hitter. Howard is playing his second year with Brockton. He is a good utility man and one of the best hitters in the league.

Barry is the most likely player of the three. He is a first baseman, and is playing his first year in professional baseball. His home is in this city. He stands fourth among the league batters, and has made only two errors this season. Pres. McCue today received an offer from the Cincinnati Club of the National League for George Gaw, a pitcher. He was looked over last week by Heinie Peitz, one of the Reds' scouts. Gaw has not had so good a winning record for Brockton as two other pitchers, owing to his wildness. However, he is regarded as one of the best pitchers in the league.

NEW BATTERY FOR BRAVES.
James and Whaling of Seattle Club, Both Big Men, Secured For \$5,000—To Report Late in Season.

Boston, June 25—The Boston National League Club, with a view to strengthening the team with young players for next season, and thereafter, have paid \$5,000 for a battery now with the Seattle club. A young giant named James is the pitcher, another big man, Whaling, is his catcher, and both have been secured.

The purchase was made on the recommendation of Amos Rusie, the old Giant pitcher, who in a letter to Johnny Ward, told the Boston manager not to let this pair get away from him. The New York Giants and other clubs were after them. Rusie says they will make a great battery, and one that is sure to be a winner in a major league.

James stands six feet three inches and weighs about 200 pounds. He is a right handed pitcher, but bats left handed, and is very clever as a batsman. Whaling is almost as big as the pitcher, and is said to be a good backstop, who can throw to bases with deadly effect. He, too, is a good batsman, and despite his size is very fast. This pair will be seen in Boston the latter part of the season.
