Ottawa, Feb. 21.—The next step in the Government's action against Price Brothers & Co., of Quebec, to compel that firm to market its newspaper paper in Canada, is a hearing before the Board of Commerce next Tuesday of counsel for Price Bros. to show cause why the board order number two, directing that stated quantities of newspaper should be shipped to Montreal publishing firms should not be made a permanent order. This will be the first opportunity of Price Bros. to state their case.

Home Rule Bill in Commons.
London, Feb. 21.—The second reading of the Irish Home Rule bill will not be taken until a fortnight hence, was announced in the House yesterday.

U. S. Military Training.
Washington, Feb. 21.—The principle of universal military training as a part of the nation's future military policy was approved today by the House military committee by a vote of 11 to 9.

Dublin, Feb. 21.—Military authorities have issued decree stipulating that after Feb. 23rd all persons in Dublin metropolitan district must remain indoors between midnight and five a. m.

For Purity of Maple Products.
Ottawa, Feb. 21.—With the idea of placing the maple industry of Canada on a world market basis, representations have been made to the Government to forbid the export of adulterated maple products. The Government feels, however, that it would be impracticable to give a guarantee of purity.
