PLAGUE CARRYING OFF CHINESE RAPIDLY.

(Special News Service)
PEKIN, Tuesday.—There have been five hundred deaths from Bubonic plague at Tong Spa, sixty miles north-east of Tien Tsin, since the outbreak of the epidemic. Cholera in the Yang Tze valley is abating, but the total number of deaths this season has been heavy. In Han Kow three hundred natives and a score of foreigners died from the maul.

CHOSEN BY LIBERALS AT THE CONVENTION TUESDAY AFTERNOON

Most Enthusiastic Gathering Ever Held in Dalhousie Court House—Winning Candidate Named.

ORGANIZATION EFFECTED

MR. JAMES REID, OF CHARLOTTETOWN, HAS AGAIN BEEN CHOSEN THE LIBERAL STANDARD BEARER FOR RESTIGOUCHE.

Despite the disagreeable weather, a large and enthusiastic meeting of the Liberals of Restigouche, was held at the court house, Dalhousie yesterday afternoon. Delegates were present from every parish in the county. All were enthusiastic and there is not a doubt that Mr. Reid will be re-elected at two o'clock by Hon. C. H. LaBillette who, on behalf of Mr. Reid, thanked the friends who had assembled at his call to choose a candidate to contest this constituency.

On entering the court house Mr. Reid was cheered to the echo. On taking the platform, he thanked the convention for the honor done him. This was the third time he had been chosen, and twice he had been elected by overwhelming majorities. He could not find language to thank the friends who had again placed him in nomination. On leaving Ottawa the prime minister, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, had done him the honor of asking him to be again a candidate for Restigouche. He had replied "Sir Wilfrid, I am getting old, but if the electors of my county decide to again honor me I will forget old age and do my best for my constituency." When Mr. Reid looked around and saw the large number of friends assembled, he was sure of another grand victory. But elections are not won by talking; they must work. The opposition had a choice store of ammunition (and some tools), and will leave no stone unturned to injure the Liberal cause, but he felt sure that these would not prevail in Restigouche.

TOWN COUNCIL DECIDES TO APPEAL CROCKETT CASE FOR DAMAGES

A meeting of the town council was held last evening, the full board in attendance. A letter was read from J. & D. A. Harquail, asking payment of a bonus of \$5,000 at once as the construction of their factory was well under way. Referred to the finance committee.

Whereas, by the British Preferential trade policy the manufactured products of the mother country are admitted at a reduction of thirty-three and one third per cent, thus encouraging trade within the empire and uniting the bonds of union between the Motherland and Canada, and

Whereas, the construction of the Transcontinental Railway and the vigorous transportation policy of the Government, has given a great impetus to the advancement of Canada, and

Whereas, the policy of peace, good will and harmony, so persistently advocated by the distinguished leader of the Liberal party, has created a feeling of trust and confidence, between races and creeds of this country, and

Whereas, under Liberal administration the buoyant revenue of the country, has enabled the Government to provide for public works, and to assist in a generous manner the different public services of the country and still provide annually a surplus in the treasury.

Therefore resolved, that the Liberals of Restigouche in convention assembled, hereby express their hearty appreciation of the great services rendered to Canada and the Empire by their distinguished leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and his associates in the Government, and pledge to him and those unfaltering allegiance and united support in the support of his policy and administration which have given Canada such a commanding position a promising future and the nations of the world.

Moved by W. F. Coleman, seconded by W. P. Moore—

Whereas Sir Wilfrid Laurier with the vision which has always characterized him in the selection of his colleagues in the Government of Canada, has called the Hon. William Pugsley, after a long and distinguished service in his native province, to a seat in his Cabinet, and has bestowed on him the portfolio of Public Works, one of the most important and responsible positions in the administration of the country, and

Whereas, this Convention recognizes the patriotic and untiring services which the Hon. Mr. Pugsley has rendered his native province in the local legislature and in the Government for many years, and has noticed the leading position he has already taken in the Parliament of Canada, and

Whereas, Mr. Pugsley has in this short time he has been Minister of Public Works rendered great services to this province in promoting the construction of needed public works and furthering other services that will aid in the advancement of this province.

Therefore resolved, that the Liberals of Restigouche in convention assembled, heartily endorse our confidence in his great ability and his efforts to advance the interests of his native province and faithfully serve the people of Canada in the position he now occupies and pledge our active support of his efforts in the present campaign to continue in office at Ottawa the Liberal Administration and Laurier.

On motion of Mr. Geo. E. Mercer, seconded by John H. Galbraith, a resolution commending the work done by Mr. Reid, as the representative of Restigouche, was also passed. In some way The Graphic reporter failed to get a copy of this.

There was some discussion as to whether the town had a proper title to the street mentioned and it was decided that the portion of the committee's report referring to it be referred back for further report.

On motion, Edward J. Smith was granted to conduct a moving picture show for one year on payment of \$300.

Anslov Bros. were granted privilege of installing a two inch standpipe for fire protection purposes and the curling rink was granted a two inch water service.

The application of Ben Roy for refund of taxes for 1908 was granted, as he has not reached the age of 21 years.

On motion the treasurer was instructed to place the sum of \$247.23 to the credit of the Board of Health to cover smallpox accounts.

Coun. McDonald stated that the treasurer had received a cheque for about half the above amount from the provincial secretary.

Coun. McLennan submitted deed from R. L. Duncan for street running, southerly from Gerrard street.

On motion the deed was received and ordered to be recorded at the registry office and said street named Cromwell avenue.

FOREST FIRES ARE SUBDUED BY THE RAIN

MONTRÉAL, Que., Tuesday.—A downpour of rain, amounting, according to the McGill observatory, to .87 of an inch, has either quenched, or greatly subdued the forest fires in this section of the country, and today for the first time in many days, the atmosphere is entirely free from fog and smoke.

It is figured that conditions on the St. Lawrence river have diverted at least a million bushels of grain from Montreal to Buffalo, and this is but a very small part of the total loss.

MONTRÉAL, Que., Tuesday.—A report from Sherbrooke says that twenty to thirty houses in the villages of Agnes and Megantic, on Lake Megantic, was burned by forest fires last night.

The women and children of the village of Megantic, which was also surrounded by fire, had left on special trains for safety, and the men were fighting the flames, when a heavy shower of rain checked the fire and saved the remainder of the village.

The loss in Agnes is estimated at \$40,000. A number of farms, and several buildings in Megantic, were also burned.
