"But I can't help thinking that the ham I used to get in my boyhood had this Virginia product beaten. Maybe they have lost the trick of curing or smoking ham, or maybe my memory has run away with my imagination.

I took a great interest in those days in watching the pig develop from its immature state, up through the aging and fattening process, and then, in the final porcine metamorphosis, into spare ribs, and sausage, and ham and just plain pork.

"It was a great day for me when they killed the pigs, especially if I was allowed to assist. And the next day, when the pig was divided forcibly into his component parts, was another great day." "We needn't follow the further disposition of these parts, except the hams.
