SMOKING HAM.

A Bucolic Art, the Memory of Which Sets the Epicure to Talking.

"I read in the papers that, beehind fed last year to pigs in quite the rage in London," said the man who looks like good eating, "and I can understand it, for it's about the most tasty thing in the ham line we can get these days."

"Now, maybe it doesn't matter what fuel is used for that slow fire, but the fire that smoked the ham by boiling knew was fed with corn cobs and nothing else. The burning cobs gave off a dense, pungent smoke. The hams were allowed to become saturated in this atmosphere for a day and then were hung in the kitchen."

FIRST AMERICAN GLASS.

Made at a Factory Built by Boston Man in a New Hampshire Town. The first American glass factory was erected in the town of Temple, N. H. Washington, in his diary, speaks of glass being made in New Haven, Conn., in the year 1789.

"One would suppose by the language he uses, that he considers it a new and quite extraordinary affair. It was nine years previous to this, and during the very war whose issue first enabled the country to commence its own manufacturing, that Robert Howes, of Boston, began to carry out the project which he had long conceived, but had hitherto found impracticable, if not impossible, under English rule—that of making glass in America for America."

In 1870 Mr. Howes selected a site for his factory on the north side of the British forces (the glassblowers were Hessians and Waldeckers—soldiers who had deserted from the British army), and he must have had an eye for the beautiful nature. He chose a spot on the north slope of Kidder Mountain, near its base.
