

#### Vigorous Protest In Parliament Against King's Visit to Russia.

London, June 4 .- Violent protests vere made by the Socialists and Labor members in the House of Commons this evening against King Edward's apevening against King Edward's ap-proaching visit to Russia in language, the offenziveness of which no attempt was made to vell. The speakers drew lurid pictures of the alleged conditions in the Muscovite Empire, declaring that while they had no objection to King Edward privately visiting his relative, Emperor Nicholas, they had the greatest abhor-remee of the idea of a state visit to Rus-sia, "with its horrors, tortures and per-secutions, fraternizing with the hangmen of Liberty in Russia."
