THE MEN NOW IN OFFICE.

Mayors, Aldermen and Reeves Elected Throughout the Province Yesterday.

CITIES.

OTTAWA.—There were six candidates for the Board of Control, including Messrs. N. Champagne, Jas. Davidson, and Robt. Hasty, members of the present board. They were all re-elected, the fourth place going to Ald. Geo. H. Wilson.

Seven new aldermen were elected to the City Council, the successful candidates in the various wards being: Victoria—Ald. Rosenthal, Ald. Brown, Dalhousie—Ald. McGrath, J. Ross, Wellington—E. H. Hinchey, Ald. Farrow, Central—Ald. Little, Ira Bowser, St. George—Ald. Cunningham, Carleton Place—Ald. Desjardins, Baxter, Ottawa—Ald. Pinard, A. Julien, Rideau—Ald. Slim, Ald. Grant.

LONDON.—Mayor Samuel Stevely was re-elected by a majority of 2,521, the vote being: Stevely, 4,472; Parsons, 1,921. The aldermen elected are: D. A. Stewart, Dan Ferguson, J. H. A. Beattie, W. J. Stevenson, E. Rose, Neil Cooper, Wm. Garry, Joshua Garrett, Robert Parsons, J. H. Saunders, C. G. Moorhead, and Jas. Fitzgerald.

BRANTFORD.—The Citizens' League put strong candidates in the field, and as a result carried eleven out of the fifteen seats in the Council. This means that local option will go to the people next year. During the last year the Council sent the issue to the people, and then reversed the decision by taking it from them.

For Mayor, William B. Wood, who has been in the Council two years, was elected by about 870 majority over Mayor Bowly, who sought a third term. Ald. Suddaby ran about 380 behind Bowly, while S. F. Whitman footed the poll with a small vote. Wood is the Liberal ex-member of the Legislature for North Brant, and ex-Registrar of Brant county. No Mayoralty candidates were endorsed by the Citizens' League. Mr. Wood, however, apparently got practically all the temperance support, while Mr. Bowly was backed by the opponents of local option. The Mayoralty vote was: Wood, 2,085; Bowly, 1,221; Suddaby, 385; Whitman, 170.

BELLEVILLE.—The contest for Mayor was between W. H. Pantier and Lorne W. Marsh, the latter being endorsed by ex-Mayor McFee last year by 28 votes. Pantier is a Conservative and Marsh a Liberal. The result was a majority of about 185 for Marsh, and great rejoicing followed.

CHATHAM.—Ald. W. H. Westman defeated Ald. John Edmondson by a majority of 300. Aldermen elected—R. L. Braekin, John McCormie, Wm. R. Peck, Chas. Austin, Frank E. Baxter, Wm. Anderson, T. L. McRitchie, S. J. Sullivan, and Harry A. Andrews. Stewart Lamont, Water Commissioner, majority, 385.

GUELPH, Jan. 4.—In the closest mayoralty fight in Guelph for many years George Hastings, a mechanic, supported by the Trades and Labor Council, defeated Ald. Geo. J. Thorp for the chair by 21 majority. Hastings, 741; Thorp, 720; Nelson, 400; Penfold, 205.

KINGSTON.—Municipal elections today were quite lively, although Mayor-elect Alderman Daniel Cooper, grocer, was elected by 93 majority over Alderman David Givens, barrister. This figure is the highest majority a Kingston Mayor ever received.

NIAGARA FALLS.—Robert P. Slater, Mayor of Niagara Falls half a dozen times, was elected Mayor today by a majority of 132, defeating Mayor Richard E. Carter.

AN UNFAVORABLE STATEMENT.

Heavy Pressure on Imperial Bank of Germany.

Berlin, Jan. 4.—The unfavorable statement issued by the Imperial Bank of Germany to-day was much discussed on the Bourse. The heavy pressure on the bank against the previous weekly return has been known, but the total outgo of \$125,000,000 exceeds all expectations. The note circulation of \$44,000,000 is the highest ever reached, being partly due to the discounting of \$16,000,000 Imperial Government treasury bills, bringing up the Government's short term bills to \$98,500,000. The expectation is that money rates will be much easier a little later in January.
