ROME. We have much pleasure in laying before our readers a letter received from Rome, on the 30th January last, and which has been kindly placed at our service by John Hughes, Esq., Wheatly River: "In my last I gave you an account of the sacrilegious attack on Rome, as well as the entry of the troops of Victor Emmanuel into the Eternal City; and, also, a hurried description of the subsequent disorders, which now put you in possession of some particulars regarding the changed state of this once quiet Rome. I may here remark that an official report of the invaders sets down their march in Rome, as having taken place somewhere about 150 or 160. The plebeian, or a voting eye or no, for a nation to what they called the 'Constitutional Kingdom of Italy,' took upon the 21st of October. It was as if a Roman remarked, a plebeian, and not a plebeian—that is, it was a killing of the people, and not a voting of them. The faint city with 50,000 bayonets in its hands, called upon to give a free vote. Very few, indeed, of the Romans went, as they could not think of bringing the rights of the Pope into question. But as no one is so foolish as to heed these kinds of plebeianisms, I shall let the outrageous mockery lie unheeded. It appears to me that those who differ from us in religion, take a false view of the temporal power of the Pope. Some, at least, seem to think that the loss of temporal power involves the overthrow of Catholicity. As you are aware, this arises from a confusion of ideas. The Church lived and spread throughout various parts of the world, when the Pope not only had no throne, but hid themselves frequently in the Catacombs. The temporal power is not, therefore, a constitutive element of the Church; it cannot be without it, and could be again without it, if it so pleased God. When we say that the temporal power is required by the Pope, we do not mean that he could not absolutely do without it; things, it is necessary for a full and free exercise of his spiritual authority. If the Pope were subject to a Government hostile to him, he would have difficulty in communicating with the rest of the world. In order, therefore, that the Pope might be free in his relations with all, Providence so disposed 'that he should have a Kingdom of his own.' It is possible that God might at some time ordain that the Pope should have a territory of their own; but it is not possible that the Church of Christ, our Holy Mother, could end on earth except with the end of ages, for the word of God cannot change. From this you can see how deluded are those who, at every attempt against the Pope's state, cry out, 'The Papacy has fallen.' Vain hope! Do they not hear the words of our Lord, 'the gates of hell shall not prevail against it?' Even then, if the Pope should never recover his lawful throne, Catholicity would not cease, but would still live, and spread itself abroad, and bear its fruit. I am inclined to think that if some of our friends only had the distinction which we make between the temporal and the spiritual powers, they would not applaud an act of public robbery. If they would not praise a public robbery, how can they praise the usurpation of lawful rights? It is wrong to approve that which it is wrong to do. No one can deny the right of the Pope to Rome and its dependencies. Their right is, as you know, the most lawful that can be imagined; and still some are found who clap their hands in joy because it has been violently unpeeped. You may ask what are the present prospects of recovery? Bright, quite bright! We can learn the same, first from his own time we remember when in 1848 Pius IX was obliged to quit Rome and went to Gaeta; but the arms of Catholic France soon drove out the Revolutionists from the Eternal City. Those lessons of the past tell us that the same will happen now, because two hundred millions of Catholics throughout the world will never permit their spiritual head to be a subject of an earthly prince. But apart from this, we have the fact, even humbly speaking, for believing in a speedy restoration. It would be impossible to give you an idea of the excitement amongst the Catholics of Europe by the usurpation of Rome. Meetings, and pilgrimages, and protests, and petitions to their various Governments are continually taking place in Belgium, Ireland, Spain, Germany, Austria, and elsewhere, and in a word, in every country. The Bishops of Prussia have petitioned King William to restore the Pope to his throne, and their petitions were favorably received, and the Arch-

Bishop of Posen was at the camp in Versailles speaking to the King about it. From that place he sent his Secretary to Rome with dispatches for the Pope. You are aware that a large number of Catholics are in the Prussian army. In fact Catholic Bavaria has done a good deal of fighting for Prussia; moreover, nine millions of Catholics are in the Prussian kingdom. Hence no one is surprised that the future Emperor of Germany should be in favor of the Pope. In 1867, the Emperor of Austria, in a similar manner, would help to maintain the Pope's temporal power. He is against revolutionists of the Italian state. The Crown Prince is more of a Catholic than a Protestant. I think if some persons considered all this, they would not think Prussia's triumph a triumph of Protestantism. The King of Bavaria, as well as the King of Belgium, are determined to aid the Pope. Thousands of Catholics are ready to take the field as soon as a regular Government takes the matter in hand. Austria, whose Government moved, but not allowed Victor Emmanuel's troops to assault Rome, is accused, and already a person has been sent with a note to Florence, which has caused the blinded pack who misrule Italy, to abate a little of their nonsensical talk. The Emperor of Austria, as an ally of the Catholic Sovereign, will never permit Pius IX to be a subject of anyone; nor will he be satisfied with the position of the Italian revolutionists wish to give him. He is a Catholic, and he is not to have no temporal authority. France, the generous nation, though unworily tried, is not forgetful of the Pope. The fall of Napoleon is no loss to Catholicity; perhaps, had he not been conquered, Rome would not have been usurped, as the people of France would have enforced respect for the Pope. On the 4th of August, some of his troops left Civita Vecchia, and on the same day he received his first defeat, and the valor of France seemed departed. True, the men fought bravely, but they were outnumbered and driven back by the French, until on the 21st September, Napoleon surrendered at Sedan. The French were in all this a punishment for the fault of the Government, in abandoning Rome. The brave Trochu, who now so gallantly defends Paris, wrote some time ago to the Pope, assuring him that he would not be sheathed until the papal dominions were restored. Lately he has written to the Pope, and has offered to send ten thousand francs to aid his Holiness. It is needless to add that the Clergy and people of France are indignant at the outrage offered to the Holy Father. As soon, then, as this dread ful war is ended, either France or Prussia, with her allies, or Austria, will restore the Pope to his throne, and the revolutionists; perhaps the three together will do it. In any case, we are sure that the present state will not continue long. In the meantime, let all Catholics pray for the speedy return of calm. "Very few visitors have come to Rome this winter, consequently money is scarce. The anti-Catholic journals, and the officials in the different departments of the late Government have left their positions, rather than take the required oath to the invaders.
