#### DRESS OF THE CIRCASSIAN WOMEN.

#### TAILED MEN.

The Nian-Nians, or Ghilans—their name signifies cannibals—form a race of men who have a great similitude to the monkey. Shorter than other negroes, they are rarely more than five feet high.
