LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

At Alma, N. B. on June 1st, snow fell of sufficient depth for fishermen to engage in a snow-balling contest.

George Low, former Superintendent of the Cape Breton Electric Co., Sydney has instituted proceedings against that Company under the Alien Labor Law for the employment of Messrs. Bernis, Batter, Towns and Bunchman, who he claims are American citizens and were brought here under contracts made in the United States. The penalty in each case may be as high as \$1,000.

We are indebted to Mr. J. D. Seaman, Secretary for this season's Calendar of the Summer School of Science for the Atlantic Provinces of Canada which will be held at Yarmouth N. S. from July 11th. to 28th. There are three classes of subjects taught in this school, viz: Physical science, Biological science, and miscellaneous including literature and drawing. Students should notify the secretary at once of their intention to attend the school and the subjects they propose taking up.

At 9 o'clock on Monday morning a solemn Pontifical Requiem Mass, for the repose of the soul of the late Bishop McIntyre, was celebrated in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. His Lordship Bishop McDonald was celebrant, assisted by Rev. Theobaldus, arch priest, Rev. Fathers McPherson and Gaudet as deacons and sub-deacons, and Rev. Dr. Morrison as master of ceremonies. The high altar and sanctuary were appropriately draped for the occasion. After Mass the Libera was sung and the absolution given at the catafalque.

The body of Mrs. George Conroy, who died at Cleveland Ohio, on Wednesday evening last, arrived here accompanied by her sorrowing husband on Saturday evening and was taken to the residence of Dr. Conroy on Sunday afternoon the remains were borne to the Cathedral where the funeral service was held. After the Libera and absolution the casket was borne to the hearse and the funeral cortege proceeded to the cemetery on St. Peter's Road. The funeral was largely attended.

The text of the speech delivered by Sir George Steward while Governor of Gibraltar at Gibraltar on Friday last has just reached London. Sir George based his speech on the recent address by the former Ambassador Choate on the subject of patriotism. The Governor said England was sadly lacking in education in regard to patriotism, compared with the United States where the vast and increasing population enjoyed the blessing of a free and unqualified wealth, which meant no sign of war and where statesmen headed by far seeing President Roosevelt neglected no opportunity to educate the children of the nation to honor the flag above all else Sir George said: "England's omission in this essential was a notable blot as fraught with dangerous potentialities."

Advices of the 1st. inst. from Christiania Norway say: All party feeling has been obliterated in the face of the crisis between Norway and Sweden, and the whole country is of one mind, but the people and the newspapers preserve sober and unprovocative temper and there is a complete absence of any warlike feeling. At the same time Norway's defenses are said to be in a far better state than they were during the crisis of 1895. The fact that General Krohnat commanding the Trondhjem district accompanied the Swedish Prince of Berlin is regarded as showing that trouble on neither side of the frontier is considered probable.

A serious accident occurred at Gloucester B. C. in the Dominion Coal Co's machine shop Saturday morning. First sets were being made on No 61 Locomotive and while the props were being set an explosion occurred. Albert Mackenzie machinist, who was putting the cover on the left tank was hurled to the ground and badly injured. Jonathan D. Tait was blown bodily through the air over a hundred feet and fell, fracturing his skull and suffering other very severe injuries. He was rendered unconscious and is hardly expected to recover. The dome of the engine was found two hundred yards away and various other parts were scattered in all directions.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Foreign Minister Delcasse has resigned from the French Ministry.

St. Petersburg advices of the 16th say that the Russian Minister to the Interior, Bouligand, and Admiral Alakoff, head of the committee for the East have resigned. The resignations had not been accepted by the Emperor at latest accounts.

A young lad was playing in a lobster factory at North Sydney C. B. on Monday and in some way slipped and fell backwards into a boiler of hot water in which the lobsters were boiling. He was scalded to death before help could reach him.

The date of the grand tea party to be held at St. Anne's, Hope River, has been changed from July 4th. to Tuesday June 27th. The tea party will be held on the latter date in the vicinity of the Church and will be the first and best Tea of the season. Look out for ad., later.

The King of Spain arrived at Portsmouth, England, on Monday from Cherbourg, France, on the Yacht Victoria and Albert. The Yacht was accompanied across the channel by British cruisers. The King wore the uniform of a British General and received a great welcome.

Mr. James A. Rule C. E. died at his home at Gibson N. B. on Friday last after an illness of several months of Bright's disease. Deceased had been divisional engineer on the Murray Harbor Branch Railway and was also in charge of the surveys at Elmira and New London last year.

London advices of the 5th, say: A dispatch to the news agency from Capetown says that native reports have been received at official quarters to the effect that Warmbad, the German headquarters southwest of Africa had fallen, and the garrison had perished. No news is obtainable except from natives sources.

On Ascension Thursday, Mr. John B. McIntyre, Ecclesiastic, was ordained sub-deacon in St. Dunstan's College chapel by his Lordship Bishop McDonald. He will be ordained deacon on Sunday the 18th. inst., and will be raised to the dignity of the Priesthood in his native parish church, Grand River, Lot 14, on June 24, Feast of St. John the Baptist.

This is what recent advices from Winnipeg say about crops prospects in the west. The C. P. R. crop report which was issued yesterday could be summarized in one word—excellent. There is not a point on the whole of the C. P. R. system through the wheat raising country from which complaints are made and as for weather conditions the only variation noted from the word favorable is the phrase "very favorable."

A large number of children, boys and girls made their first Communion in the Cathedral on Sunday last and their ranks were supplemented by many who renewed their first Communion of last year. In the afternoon most of those who had been admitted to Communion in the morning and others were confirmed by his Lordship Bishop McDonald. The sermon to those to be confirmed was preached by Rev. Father McGuigan. His Lordship was assisted in the Confirmation service by Rev. Fathers McGuigan and Joseph Gallant as deacons and sub-deacons and Rev. Dr. McLaughlin as master of ceremonies.

At Montreal on Monday, Judge Lafontaine, extradition commissioner, formally committed Gaynor and Greene for extradition to the United States where they are wanted for trials on charges of obtaining large sums of money from the Government through fraud in connection with the construction of Government works for which they were contractors. The judgment was very voluminous, taking about three hours to deliver. The Judge sums up by: "That on July 6, '97, the accused fraudulently received from Captain Carter the sum of \$375,000, knowing the same had been stolen by him and that the offence of receiving stolen property is punishable under the laws of both countries, and is by treaty action three an extradition crime." The prisoners have fifteen days further to take what action they desire before being handed over to the United States authority.

The lobster factory of Sutherland Brothers at Cable Head was burned to the ground on Wednesday night of last week. The fire started from the boiler about midnight and when discovered was so far advanced that it was impossible to save the building. About two hundred cases of lobsters were in the building at the time; but most of these were saved. The loss is estimated at \$1,500. The Messrs. Sutherland did not do more to mourn over their loss; but showed their pluck by immediately starting the building of a new factory, and are hard at work again. So quickly did they proceed with the work of rebuilding that they missed only two hauls of traps. They are much and deservedly complimented on their quick work.
