The steam barge Siberia, which arrivthe Gold watch by a Large Majority-A ed from Ashtabula yesterday afternoon, has on the largest cargo of coal that ever came to the port of Duluth-1,964 tons.

This is full ten or twelve tons more than the schooner David Dows' largest cargo this season, though that vessel has given 2,000 tons to the reporter. Taken altogether, the Siberia is rather the finest barge that ever steamed into this harbor, and Capt, John McArthur, in command, is of the opinion that, with one excep-tion, she is the best that floats on fresh water to-day. She is 276 feet in length, with 39 foot beam, and 19-foot hold.
