

GENERAL ASSEMBLY IN SESSION IN HALIFAX

Presbyterian Ministers From All Over Canada Convene in Garrison City After Ten Years—Dr. Forrest is Mentioned as Likely to Be Elected Moderator.

Halifax, May 31.—After an interval of ten years, during which the church at large has made great growth, the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada will again convene in this city tomorrow. The first formal gathering will occur at 8 p.m. in St. Matthews church, where the session of 1900 also sat. The annual session will be presided by the retiring moderator, Rev. Dr. Samuel Lyle, minister of the Central Presbyterian church of Hamilton, after which the session of the new moderator will take place. All the local arrangements for the gathering have been perfected, and a successful conference on the questions which will come up for discussion seems assured. Very few of the members of the churches which arrived in the city, almost all being due to come in on the regular and special trains tomorrow afternoon and evening. Several of the prominent ministers from the central west will arrive on the Canadian Pacific train at 10 p.m. tomorrow night too late to take part in the opening ceremonies.

Interesting Reminiscences. Many reminiscences of the meeting of the assembly in this city ten years ago were related to the press representative. Among the great leaders of the last generation who were present at that time were Principal Cavan, of Knox college, Toronto; Principal Grant, of Queens college, Kingston; Principal Warden, of Victoria; Rev. Dr. Warden, of Toronto; Rev. Joseph Hogg of Winnipeg, and many others, all of whom have since passed away. Rev. Robert Campbell, minister of Perth, Ont., preached the sermon and the Rev. Allan Pollok, D.D., principal of the Presbyterian college in this city, was elected as moderator. Halifax people anticipate that something of a similar nature will happen this year and that the Rev. John Forrest, D.D., for many years president of Dalhousie college in Halifax, will be elected to the same position. There can be no doubt regarding the esteem in which Dr. Forrest is held in the Presbyterian church in Canada and his election to a high office will be regarded as a fitting termination of a long life, unflinchingly spent in the service of the denomination.

Port Arthur, Ont., May 29.—The C. N. R. survey party, locating the proposed connecting link between the lines of the Grand Trunk and the Nipigon, through which the line is to continue to Sudbury, have worked back to Current River. From all accounts engineers found a very satisfactory route, with a grade of four tenths which is regarded as very favorable considering the character of the country, and will allow heavy hauls between Port Arthur and the head of Thunder Bay line, located quite near the shore.

COMMANDED FORCES OF MULAI HAFID

Late Commander of Morocco Forces Visits Western Canada—Saskatoon His Objective Point.

Winnipeg, May 28.—Kaid Belton, who was from April, 1908, to February of this year the commander in chief of the Sultan of Morocco's Mulaï Hafid army, is in the city today, on his way to Saskatoon. Mr. Belton is an Englishman, 28 years of age. He went to South Africa at the commencement of the Boer war, and at the age of 19 had gained the rank of lieutenant for services in the field. He served under Colonel S. Hughes, M.P., who went to South Africa with the Canadian contingent, and speaks very highly of the work done by the Canadian troops. Mr. Belton afterwards served with the Zulu rebellion, during which he attained the rank of captain.

Final action on the matter of church union cannot be taken by this assembly. Under the law of the church a matter of this kind must be considered by the presbytery, and what the assembly will do this year will be to adopt the report of the union committee and send the matter down to the presbyteries for consideration. During the coming church year all the presbyteries will vote on the matter and then the assembly will come up for consideration at the assembly of 1911. The only matter of high office which will be reported to the assembly in that year will be to consider whether the minority against union is of sufficient weight to warrant the church in deferring action for a time. If the majority is clear for union, the church will vote to go forward with the proposal.

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TRADE RELATIONS WITH ITALY AND BELGIUM

Order-in-Council Will be Passed Extending to These Countries Benefits of Canadian Intermediate Tariff—New Governor for P. E. I.—The King's Birthday.

Ottawa, May 30.—Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance, and Hon. Wm. Peterson, minister of customs, expect to leave for England on June 10th to take part in the concluding deliberations of the Imperial Royal Commission respecting trade between the West Indies and Canada. Before their departure it is expected that the pending trade negotiations with Italy and Belgium will be concluded and an order-in-council will be passed extending to these countries the benefits of the Canadian intermediate tariff on a number of items, included in the treaty with France, Italy removing any special disabilities under which the countries labor in respect of trade with Canada because of the Franco-Canadian agreement. In view of the fact that France extends to the U. S. the same rates as those given Canada under that agreement the government feels free to reduce in the interests of the Canadian consumers the duties on imports from Italy and Belgium which compare with the imports from France. The reduction of 1 1/2 per cent, bound duties on such items which the intermediate tariff rate gives will only effect such imports as silk or other commodities which will not compete with any item of home manufacture. The question of a reciprocal trade agreement with the U. S. has been shelved by the cabinet until the fall for reasons already published. Hon. Mr. Fielding will return to Ottawa on Tuesday.

THE KING'S BIRTHDAY. The birthday of King George V. June 3rd will be a statutory holiday in Canada, although in view of his majesty's proclamation that he would follow the precedent of King Edward VII. and observe the Emperor's general holiday in honor of the late Queen Victoria, there will be no general observance of the day. Being a statutory holiday however all banks will be closed, thus making the Canadian railway in Canada within two weeks. The cabinet yesterday decided that no proclamation should be issued to exempt Friday next from the provisions of the bill of exchange act, which declares that the King's birthday shall be a public holiday. Hon. Benjamin Rogers of Alberta, Prince Edward Island, has been appointed lieutenant governor of that province, succeeding the late Hon. D. L. MacKinnon. 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ST. LOUIS WOMAN ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Mrs. Doxey Charged at St. Louis With Poisoning Death of Her Husband—Two of Her Late Spouses Have Died Suddenly and Another Has Disappeared.

St. Louis, Mo., May 28.—Preparations are completed for the trial of the Doxey murder case which is on the calendar of the criminal court for today. The case had originally been set for March 28th, but was postponed until May 23, by agreement of counsel. The case, which presents many interesting and unusual features, has attracted considerable interest throughout the state and also in several other states, where the defendants had previously lived. According to the records and information unearthed by the prosecution, William J. Erder, a post office clerk at St. Louis, was married to Clayton, a suburb of this city, on April 20th, 1908, to Mrs. Dora Elizabeth Fuller Doxey, who was charged with the murder of her husband. Mrs. Doxey, who was 36 years of age, had married a woman whose name was given as Dora E. Dodd, of Des Moines, Ia. It is expected to show that Dora E. Dodd was in reality Mrs. Doxey. A short time after their marriage Mrs. Doxey married another man, who to her husband Dr. Loren B. Doxey, which her mother and sister were then shipped to Dr. Doxey at Columbus, Neb. Mrs. Doxey signed a certificate stating that Erder had died of tuberculosis. Immediately after the death of her alleged husband Mrs. Doxey packed up all her household furniture and three days later she shipped it to her real husband, Dr. Loren B. Doxey, practicing his profession at Columbus, Neb. Mrs. Doxey herself started for the state of Nebraska, and making an affidavit that she was the widow of Erder, she was in the possession of the life of Erder's sister Elizabeth, who had died shortly after Erder's marriage. Mrs. Doxey's brother, another sister of Wm. J. Erder, suspecting that her brother had not died a natural death, had been investigated, which soon confirmed her suspicions. She ascertained that the furniture had been shipped to Dr. Doxey at Columbus, Neb. She went to Columbus and found that the alleged widow of her brother William was living there as Mrs. Doxey. To gain time and detain the woman until a careful investigation could be made here, Mrs. Doxey was charged with bigamy on the charge of bigamy. Of course, the charge fell flat, as the Doxey's case came up in December of last year, that they had been lawfully married at Burlington, Ia., on August 30, 1906. Mrs. Doxey's husband, Dr. Loren B. 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VALUABLE MANUSCRIPT.
