**New York Aroused by Kidnapping Case.**

New York, June 22.—One of the most energetic hunts for a lost child ever set on under way by the New York police is on to-day for three year old Michael Schneca, a son of a wealthy Italian physician, who was boldly kidnaped late yesterday, almost under the very eyes of his parents, by Black Hands, who for three years have been threatening to steal the child unless money was paid them.

Dr. Mariano Schneca, the father, one of the best known Italian physicians in the United States, has been the subject of Black Hand attention since far back in the Petrosino time. When his boy was four months old, and the physician, who had foregone a lucrative practice in a fashionable district to work among his own countrymen, was prospering in a modest way in the Italian quarters, envy of his accumulations prompted demands upon him by blackmailing hands. Letter after letter was sent him, accompanied by bloodthirsty threats and declarations that his son would be stolen if he would not pay the blackmailers \$1,000. He put the case in the hands of the late Lieut. Petrosino, and the activity of the noted detective soon caused the letters to cease.

Soon after Petrosino was assassinated in Sicily, the Blackhanders got busy again. Letters have come with increasing frequency lately, and yesterday the threats were made good by the kidnaping of little Michael. Bait in the form of candy is believed to have lured the child far enough to permit the kidnapers to carry him off.

**Fishery News.**

One of the largest fish firms in the city had news from Placentia to-day stating that there is a great improvement in the fishery there and at Argenta. The traps did well there yesterday, and one at Long Island Head had 100 quintals, which is a very fine haul. One of Jobs traps set outside this port, yesterday had fully 100 qtls. fish in it when the men went out to it, but it had become fouled with the bottom and all the fish except 13 qtls. was lost.

**NORWEGIAN FISHERY FINISHED.**—The Norwegian fishery finished yesterday, the total catch being 55,700,000, as against 56,519,000 for last year. The difference between this and last year is very little, and is thought that the catch will not affect the price of the staple.

**BAND PRACTICE.**—The C. L. B. band will meet to-morrow night for practice instead of Thursday as ordered.

**Scamps Lie in Wait for Immigrants.**

BOSTON, Mass., June 20.—Problems confronting immigrants are discussed at length in the annual report of the North American Civic League for Immigrants, made public here to-night.

The object of the League is to protect the immigrant on and immediately after his arrival. Speaking of conditions as the League officials found them at the docks when they began their work, the report says: "Little was being done to frustrate the legion of scamps who receive the incoming tide of strangers as soon as they passed the Federal gates and everywhere there was a lack of co-operation. Results are already noticeable although far from being sufficient."

**Fads and Fashions.**

Twists and knots of silk matching the parasol covering, are the sole decoration of the newest sunshades. These loops are arranged close to the outer edge.

Plaids, striped, bordered and handpainted silk parasols are displayed in tempting numbers. Linen is always favored, while rajah has stepped into front rank.

Some of the pretty foulard petticoats are finished with lace-trimmed ruffles. A muslin ruffle under the outer ruffle helps to lengthen the life of the skirt.

To carry with frocks and suits which are trimmed with the Paisley silk, there are parasols of all-over Paisley silk with carved wood handles and silk handbags to match.

The short coats range in length from hip to within two inches of the knees. So far the really short coat and the Eton jacket have not gained any secure position.

One of the newest gowns has the skirt cut with a double box plait in back, a narrow gore in front, and finished with a shaped flounce, the sides of the skirt being circular.

To fill in the coat with a deep shawl collar, there are vests of white

linen on black and white checked linen, piped in different colors and buttoning with small gilt buttons.

Tailored costumes with the white linen or with the fine hair stripes of black or color are remarkably smart if made up with pipings of a plain linen, matching the color of the hair line.

Pleasant frills for the neck are now made of Paisley printed silk and covered with white tulle, the two materials fine pleated together and edged with a stiff band of the Paisley silk.

It apparently makes little difference whether the coats of the tailored linen suits have one, two or three buttons. The fastenings, whatever the number, are placed down well toward the waistline.

To carry with light silk or lingerie frocks, there are exquisite little handbags of silk in delicate pastel colors, hand-embroidered and mounted in Oriental silver. A tiny coin purse is fitted inside.

The veiling of everything amounts to a mania. Varied and startling effects are thus obtained. Sometimes as many as three layers of chiffon or gauze are interposed, one above the other, with iridescent effects.

The rosette on the plain sailor hat gives all the richness necessary. Folded like a rose in a round shape, a bias piece of Persian silk has been so manipulated that its final effect would suggest both expense and art.

**Reno Sports to Welcome Jeffries.**

Reno, Nevada, June 22.—The Reno sporting fraternity prepared this morning to give Jim Jeffries a hearty welcome. Jeffries has a host of admirers in this city, and his supporters are anxious to extend him a hearty greeting on his arrival from California.

Preparations were made at Mona Springs yesterday for the retired champion's advent to his new training camp. Excellent quarters have been provided. It is hardly likely that Jeffries will do any training work to-day, other than light exercise to rid himself of stiffness he may have contracted as a result of the trip from the coast.

Work on the arena for the big fight began with a rush this morning. The structure is planned to accommodate upwards of 15,000 spectators, and its cost is estimated at about \$17,000.

The arena and the \$10,000 fight license are Reno's contribution to Promoter Rickard for bringing the battle to this city.

Promoter Hester said late last night he is "still up in the air" concerning the Ketchel-Langford fight.

Rickard holds out no hopes to him of allowing that contest to be staged as a morning preliminary to the Jeffries-Johnson fight.
