Safe Swimming Pools.

We congratulate the Mayor and Councilors of the city on their promptitude in taking up the matter of providing for the boys and youths who are in the habit of resorting to suburban waters for a bath, or a swim. The exercise is wholesome and manly and should be encouraged where proper provision is made for safety. As will be seen an attempt to provide a safe pool will be made at Quidi Vidi pond, and a conference will be held with the Assembly members for St. John's West and East with a view of providing other safe bathing places. The co-operation of the St. John's Ambulance Society, as is indicated by Dr. Maspreson's letter in regard to instructions and life lines will add much to the provisions for saving life which may be endangered. It seems to us, however, that it is essential to provide a man at each place to oversee each site and to be ready to render aid promptly.

BAILBAO, Spain, July 29. On account of the public excitement here over the Church and State question the Governor has interdicted Catholic and other manifestations which had been arranged to take place next Sunday.

MADRID, July 29. El mundo discussing the threatened break between the Spanish Government and the Vatican over the refusal of Premier Canalejas to rescind the Imperial Decree which permits non-catholic societies to display the insignia for public worship, says the Holy See has no reason to feel offended. It is heading towards a rupture which will precipitate the opening of a rapid and energetic anti-clerical campaign.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, July 29. Don Jaime de Bourbon, the Carlist Pretender to the Spanish Throne today issued a manifesto to the Carlists in part congratulating them upon their loyalty to the Pope and their defence of the Church and declaring, "I think the day is not far distant when my followers must rally to our flag. I will lead the battle." Ominous reports are received following the publications of the news that a rupture between the Spanish Government and the Vatican appears imminent. At San Sebastian, Don Jaime has issued a manifesto in which he says that he will lead the Carlists in the battle which he intimates may be called soon. It is expected that Premier Canalejas will ask King Alfonso to set the stamp of his Majesty's approval upon the course that the Premier has adopted.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, July 29. At the conclusion of a conference between King Alfonso and Premier Canalejas this evening, it was announced that Marquis Emilio De Ojeda, Spanish Ambassador to the Vatican, had been recalled. At the same time the opinion was expressed that a rupture with the Vatican was inevitable. Senor Canalejas told the King that the Government could not accept the condition of the Vatican's last note and that the Vatican would be so informed. The Premier will continue his anti-clerical programme counting upon the support of King Alfonso. During the negotiations between the Vatican and Spain Marquis De Ojeda has complained of ill-health. On July 12 the negotiations were suspended because of illness and last Monday it was stated that he was insisting on more pressing terms on being relieved of his duties as ambassador to the Vatican. The order sent to Marquis De Ojeda to leave post signifies that the rupture which Senor Canalejas described as inevitable is virtually accomplished. Marquis De Ojeda himself in a recent pleading illness has insisted on his return on the ground that the position of the Government at Rome was no longer tenable and that he considered a rupture between the Vatican and Government imminent.

Spain's initiative in recalling Ambassador De Ojeda is expected to be followed by the departure from Madrid of Monsignor Vico, the Papal Nuncio when the rupture will be completed. Senor Canalejas is preparing for a supreme battle.

LONDON, July 29. The conference of the two dominant parties who are trying to impose the constitutional differences of the House of Lords and the House of Commons already have succeeded in bridging several important points, and a statement made by Premier Asquith in the lower chamber this afternoon indicates that the outlook for a compromise is more hopeful than had been anticipated. Unless a rupture occurs during the recess little more of an official character is likely to be heard regarding the negotiations until parliament reassembles on Nov. 15. Mr. Asquith after citing that the conference in the course of twelve meetings had surveyed the field of controversy carefully said, our discussions have made some progress, although we have not so far reached an agreement, as to render it in the opinion of all of us not only desirable but necessary that they should continue. In fact I may go further; we would think it wrong at this stage to break them off. The Premier added that if further deliberations showed no prospect of an agreement that could be announced in parliament next session, the conference would be closed.

OTTAWA, July 29. The conflict of the fisheries jurisdiction between the province of British Columbia and the Dominion Government is to be settled by an appeal to the Supreme Court. The Province claims the right to issue exclusive fishing licences in waters within the railway belt territory which is under federal jurisdiction in tidal and navigable waters and also to issue licences to fish within a marine league of the coast of the province. The Dominion claims that the issuing of such licences falls within the jurisdiction of the Dominion Fisheries Department. The Supreme Court has been asked by the Federal Government to answer a stated list of questions involving the constitutional issues.

OTTAWA, July 29. An order in Council has been passed fixing the rates of pay for the officers and men of the naval service of Canada. The main figures were made public during the last session of parliament, but the present order gives them in much greater detail for all ranks of the service. The pay and allowances and gratuities are based upon the rates in the Imperial Navy taking into consideration the increased cost of living in Canada. On the whole the rates vary from 25 to over 50 per cent more than the British Navy.

Another Boy Drowned

This week has certainly been prolific of drowning accidents. On Monday a very sad accident similar to those which happened in St. John's, occurred at Port aux Basques, the victim being a boy named Sheaves aged 12 years. The boy with two little tots went to a pond just above the hill near the cable house and went out to bathe. He could not swim and going out over his depth he went down in a hurry. He rose three times to the surface but the little chaps with him could render no aid, and they were so frightened that they did not make an outcry or report the matter until over a half hour after the boy had disappeared. Then men went to the scene with ladders and in a short while secured the body. His father is a fireman on the Harlaw and came home by the Bruce yesterday. The parents are grief-stricken over the boy's sad fate.

Crippen Arrested on Steamer Montrose.

London, July 26.—According to the Express, which prints a circumstantial account of the arrest of Dr. Crippen and his companion aboard the steamer Montrose, the latter burst into tears when arrested, and is now in a state of collapse and ready to make a sworn statement. Dr. Crippen, upon having a capable berth prove his innocence on the charge of murder. The two are now in separate cabins and are closely watched. Enquiries have been made established that Doctor Crippen and the Le Neve woman spent all the time from July 10 to July 20 in Brussels, staying at an hotel. Thence they went to Antwerp. They have not been in France at all. Scotland Yard deprecates the certain assumption that the couple on the Montrose are Dr. Crippen and Miss Le Neve.

The accumulating evidence points to the certainty that the couple aboard the Montrose are Dr. Crippen and Ethel Le Neve. Their movements have been traced practically since they left London, most of the time being spent in Belgium under the alias of Robinson, the girl throughout posing as Robinson's son.

When purchasing passage tickets at Antwerp Robinson particularly insisted upon having a capable berth cabin. The London Express publishes a circumstantial story of their arrest on board the Montrose.

On Friday the couple were overheard discussing their escape, according to the paper, and the captain of the steamer communicated with Scotland Yard on Saturday decided to arrest the couple.

Crippen was searched and deprived of a revolver and cartridges and a new knife. He demanded to know what offence he was charged with and was informed he had contravened the law by giving an assumed name and travelling with a woman in the guise of a boy. As he was unable to provide proofs that his name was Robinson or that the woman was his wife, and the girl were placed under arrest in separate cabins and are being watched night and day.

New York, July 26.—With the young couple dressed as a boy, the pair boarded the Montrose at Antwerp under the name of Rev. Mr. Robinson and son. The elder man was essentially clerical. He wore clothes of Anglican cut, spectacles, a short beard, and a shorn upper lip. His eyebrows were very heavy, and formed a prominent characteristic. It was the lead of the lead the he of officers of the Montrose to suspect that all was not as it seemed with the passengers.

The putative clergyman and his son occupied a second class cabin, and one day, soon after sailing, a sharp-eyed steward noticed that one of Rev. Robinson's eyebrows had been misplaced for an instant. He mentioned the phenomenon, and soon afterward the sex of the so-called "son" was discovered.
