#### MONTREAL IN STORM GRIP.

MONTREAL, Sept. 30. The windows of a number of great stores on the city main streets were crashed in, thousands of cellars were flooded, many shade trees were uprooted, or their branches wrenched off, and blown through the streets. The temperature which had been muggy, fell fourteen degrees immediately, and almost an inch of rain fell within ten minutes. The wind attained a velocity of seventy miles an hour, the highest ever recorded by McGill University. Mortality among horses was great, these animals being struck by falling debris. Fires were started in various sections.

#### IN OTHER PLACES.

TORONTO, Sept. 30. Very few towns and cities in Ontario escaped severe damages, and in some places fatalities were reported by the hurricane, to-day. Unrooted houses and collapsed buildings resulted in Hamilton, Kingston and Kitchener, each report the death of a school boy.

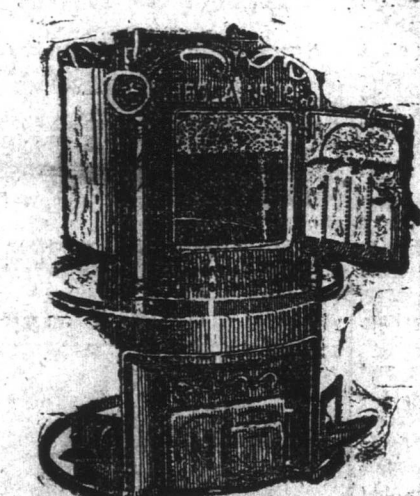
