Unfair Criticism.

The Maritime Merchant is a well gotten up and finely printed bi-weekly journal, published at Halifax, Nova Scotia, in the interests of the general trade of that and the other Maritime Provinces. As its name implies, it is devoted to the interests of the lower provinces, the fishing provinces of Canada, and particularly to Nova Scotia and the Nova Scotian fisheries. Generally authoritative on all matters it discusses appertaining to the fisheries and trade, its articles are accepted as criteria of accuracy and copied more or less into the daily papers of the Maritime Provinces and of Newfoundland. The Telegram has ever found a wealth of information in the "Maritime Merchant" and has not hesitated to circulate its pronouncement for the benefit of all concerned. Nor will we in future, but we must take exception to certain of the comments relating to Dried Fish, as made in the current issue. They are somewhat unfair and generally unfounded. Speaking of consignment cargoes of fish to foreign markets, the "Merchant" declares without qualification that Newfoundland is the worst offender in this connection, forgetting, perhaps, that from time immemorial this Colony was doing consignment business abroad long ere the Nova Scotian Bank fishery was thought about. Consignment has been the custom of the country, though to-day there is a well developed movement getting under way to abandon this method of carrying on the export fish business. The Spanish duty to which the "Merchant" refers, as imposed against prohibition countries, has been removed, and Newfoundland fish may now enter Spanish ports unhampered by this tax. Discussing foreign prices the "Merchant" has another fling at this Colony. It says: "With Newfoundland butting in here, and Norway or some other exporter butting in there, it is impossible to estimate what we (Nova Scotia) shall be able to sell between now and next spring's fishing." Newfoundland has not butted in on Nova Scotia's fish markets. On the contrary, that Province has been the "buttinsky". Our markets were established long ere Nova Scotia was recognized as a fish producing country, and if anything the latter has attempted, to "cut in" on the trade of this Colony abroad. Without further comment we append the article discussed in order that readers may determine for themselves the unfounded charges raised.

"If there has been any improvement in the dried fish situation it is not yet visible from where we sit. Probably the most hopeful thing to-day is that consumption in some countries has been larger of late, and that therefore world stocks are now that much less than they might have been. Oporto reports quite large sales, though at ruinous prices, and in the Spanish markets there is also a larger consumption than for some time past. Northern Brazil too has been taking a few cargoes, but they show no profit whatever to the exporter; fact is that every sale these days means a loss. One of the things which is most influential in creating demoralization is the activity of the

consignment business. We hear of consignments to markets which have hitherto been "order" markets only. The result of course is that buyers in these markets, not knowing what may be on its way, are disposed to be very chary about buying anything outright at all.

"Newfoundland is the worst offender in this connection, and yet her situation at present is so serious that no one can blame her for doing everything she can to dispose of her stocks. Just at present the Italian market is overloaded with consignments from Newfoundland, so probably there will be a reduction in her shipments there to give the situation a chance to clear itself. Newfoundland is handicapped in making sales to Spain by a heavy duty because of her prohibition sentiments. Norway, which is also a prohibition country, made a deal with the Spanish Government whereby they agreed to take a certain quantity of Spanish wines in return for fish. How they disposed of the purchase we do not know, but at any rate they got some fish business which might have come to Newfoundland. We understand that one of the members of the Newfoundland Government is now in Madrid talking the situation over. The provinces of Quebec and British Columbia we suspect might have a chance for some business in the Spanish market, but alas they haven't the "cure" that suits the Spanish people, at least not enough of it which is not likely to be wanted in other markets.

"The price of Lunenburg bank fish at present is nominally \$8.50 delivered Halifax, though we heard last week of one cargo being purchased at \$6.30. Along the waterfront they will tell you that the bottom of the market has not yet been reached, but no doubt you can hear a different view expressed at Lunenburg. The situation would seem to be that if the outsiders would only let our markets alone, they would be able to absorb all the supplies we have for them, but with Newfoundland butting in here, and Norway or some other exporter butting in there, it is impossible to estimate just what we shall be able to sell between now and next spring's fishing. These are indeed perplexing days in the fish trade, and they seem likely to continue for some time to come."

To Correspondents Generally.

Several lengthy letters have been recently received, covering the pros and cons of a subject which has received considerable ventilation of late. As this matter is one which concerns the promoters only—the public evincing but little interest in the movement, we do not consider that it is advisable to publish the communications now before us. It is much better to let sleeping dogs lie. If the populace really becomes aroused over this matter, the consequences would undoubtedly be serious hence we have no desire to put a lighted match to a powder keg. We trust that our esteemed correspondents will realize the position.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

CANADA-AUSTRALIA AGREEMENT.

MELBOURNE, Dec. 13.
Hon. J. A. Robb, Canadian Minister of Trade and Commerce, has completed preliminary negotiations with the Australian Commonwealth Tariff Board for a reciprocal Customs agreement between Canada and Australia.

A TYPHUS EPIDEMIC.

LONDON, Dec. 13.
An epidemic of Typhus of a violent type is sweeping through the district of Erria in the northwest part of Country Mayo, and whole families have been wiped out, according to a Ballina despatch to the Daily Express. There has been nothing like it since the time of the great Irish famine.

CLEAN SWEEP.

DUBLIN, Dec. 13.
National troops have made a clean sweep of the entire Fermoy area during the past week, according to official reports issued yesterday. Many irregulars were captured, together with arms and equipment and considerable stolen property was recovered.

DON'T GO TO NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.
Prohibition authorities have ruled that all persons possessing liquor in Broadway cafes and cabarets, raided by Prohibition agents, will be placed in jail, and patrons of such places are required to give names and addresses as material evidence. The practice of handing summonses to proprietors of places selling liquor has been abandoned, and summary arrests will be made instead.

SECOND NEGRO LYNCHED.

PERRY, Florida, Dec. 13.
The second of two negroes, arrested on Friday, in connection with the murder of Miss Ruby Hendry, school teacher, was lynched on Monday, when Arthur Young was taken from the officers as they were attempting to transfer him from one jail to another.

IN GOOD COMPANY.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.
Sir Patrick McGrath, who has been abroad on the Newfoundland Labrador Boundary Question, landed here to-day from the Majestic from Southampton. Lady Thornton, daughter and guest, family of the new head of the Canadian National Railway were also passengers.

FIRST CHAIRMAN.

DUBLIN, Dec. 13.
Lord Glenavy, formerly Sir James Campbell, was elected Chairman of the Free State Senate yesterday. Senator Douglas, elected Vice-Chairman, moved the appointment of a Committee to work for an immediate cessation of hostilities through the Free State.

CARGO STEAMER ASHORE.

BOSTON, Dec. 12.
The British steamer Manchester Spinner is ashore on Long Island, in Boston harbor, according to wireless calls for assistance intercepted here to-day. The message said anchors refused to hold in a northwest gale. The Spinner is five thousand tons and owned by Manchester Liners Limited, and arrived in Boston on December 5th from Hull.

ALL THE WORLD WANTS IT.

LONDON, Dec. 13.
Supplementary estimate for one million pounds sterling, for relief of unemployed was agreed by House of Commons early to-day, toward the close of a sixteen hour session, prolonged by tactics of Labor Party, who had moved to prevent the prorogation of Parliament until adequate measures had been taken against the unemployment evil.

Imperial Wines Offered for Sale.

VIENNA.—Rare wines to the value of 25,000,000 crowns, or about \$50,000 at the present rate of exchange, still lie in the cellars of the Imperial Palace. On the vintage of red wine known as "Jachauer of Empress Elisabeth" from grapes grown from vines brought by her from Greece, is being sold at 500,000 crowns the bottle, or approximately \$12. There is said to be the largest stock of original Chateaus, both green and white, in the world stored in those cellars, and it is to be sold abroad for standard money only.

Sultan Departs.

LEAVES WIVES BEHIND—A MYSTERIOUS GIRL.

The Sultan's departure from Turkey in the British warship Malaya on Friday morning, Nov. 27, is a romantic episode that may well prove to be also of historic significance. None of the Sultan's three wives accompanied him to Malta, but his 10-year-old son, Prince Eltroshul, is with his father. He is a bright-looking boy, remarkably well-dressed, and evidently he regarded the whole enterprise as a most agreeable adventure. The control of the palace, including the harem, has been taken over by Nationalist officers and renames under the orders of Rafet Pasha, the Governor of Constantinople. They have sealed up the private and State apartments, and seven eunuchs are all that remain of the former large establishment. These negro guardians take turns on duty day and night, before the door at the end of the passage which leads from the main palace to the harem. Within this walled and shuttered part of the palace are the Sultan's three official wives. The eldest is about 50. The Sultan married her when he was virtually a royal captive during the reign of his brother, Abdul Hamid. By her he has had two daughters, one of whom is married to a son of Tewfik Pasha, the ex-Grand Vizier. The other is married to the son of Abdul Medjid, the Sultan's cousin and heir-apparent. The second wife, who is 32, is tall and handsome. She is the mother of the Sultan's only son, Prince Eltroshul. The lad lived in the harem, but he came out every day for lessons, including English, from a Turkish naval captain of the Sultan's suite. The third wife is rather a mystery. The Sultan is believed to have married her two months ago. She is said to be only 16 (the Sultan is 61), extremely beautiful, and the daughter of a gardener. As she has never been seen outside the harem even veiled, the stories of her wonderful dark eyes and white, shapely form are probably imaginary.

Besides these official wives, there remain within the forbidden walls some 200 women. There are concubines, slaves (for in high circles in Turkey such domestic slavery still lingers), bath attendants, and other servants. It is stated that the Turkish Heir-Apparent has been elected Sultan. The Malaya, with the Sultan on board, arrived at Malta on Monday morning.
