

World Court Proposed by Senator Lodge

Saskatchewan in the Grip of a Blizzard—Committee on Church Union has Reached Final Stages—Strike in Ruhr Causes a Serious Situation.

WORLD COURT PROPOSED.
WASHINGTON, May 8. The establishment of a World Court at The Hague, which the United States Senate has proposed to-day, was introduced by Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee. The purpose of creating the new court, President Coolidge would be requested to propose the resolution embodied a complete resolution for the proposed Court. It would be composed of 16 judges, four of whom would be selected by an electoral commission.

CHURCH UNION DEBATE DRAWING TO A CLOSE.
OTTAWA, May 8. The sixth day of hearings of the Church Union Bill before the Committee on Private Bills Committee and the day since its opponent took the stand in sight so far as formal argument is concerned there is still one opposing speaker to be heard, after that, Counsel will sum up both sides. NATIONAL CHURCH.
OTTAWA, May 8. It is to be the beginning of a national Protestant church, asserted W. B. Browne, of Red Deer, who spoke to-day in opposition to the Church Union Bill, before the House of Commons' Private Bills Committee. He was later questioned by J. J. Hughes, of the Edward Island, and said that he had heard the statement made in the working committee, with the idea that no Government would resist such a church.

RUHR STRIKE ASSUMING SERIOUS FORM.
BERLIN, May 8. The situation in the Ruhr where the miners are out, because of refusal to meet the demands of the Government for the addition of an eighth working day, is admitted serious. Government circles are deeply concerned, and the departure for the Ruhr last night of Labor Minister Braun, to a personal effort to settle the situation, emphasizes the gravity of the situation. The entire German Government is apprehensive that the consequences may have untoward consequences as regards German internal peace and foreign policy. Fear of a German civil war is expected, it being pointed out that the Ruhr miners are using financial reserves and may be driven by hunger to plunder.

WINTER WEATHER IN SASKATCHEWAN.
CHEWAN, May 8. Records of freak weather at different times of the year are numerous in Saskatchewan, but none approach the record which ranges over a large portion of southwest Saskatchewan on May 8 and Monday. Snow in several places was reported to a depth of ten inches. The telephone and telegraph service was interrupted and operations are at a standstill.

GERMAN CAPITALISTS WOULD FINANCE HUDSON BAY PROJECT.

SASKATOON, May 8. German capitalists are ready to go along with the Hudson Bay railway project and develop the mineral, oil, and other resources, adjacent to Hudson Bay. This announcement was made by Colonel R. H. Webb, member of the Working Committee of the "On the Bay to the Bay" Association here to-day. The Germans had offered \$100,000,000 before the war to carry out this project. Since the war the Germans had again offered to develop these, and the question of the Canadian Government to allow the Germans to do so, or to complete the road themselves.

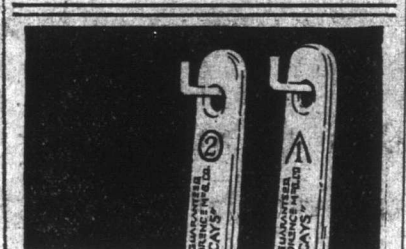

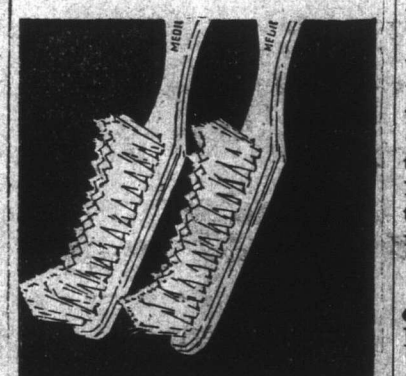
BROWN VS. BRAINS.
