

**Fishing Plant Destroyed
at St. Anthony**

A message from St. Anthony to Inspector General Hutchings received

yesterday, states that the fishing premises owned by Benjamin Fennell, more of that place had been destroyed by fire with all its contents. Included in the property destroyed was four cod traps and provisions. The fire loss is estimated to be about \$3,000.

A 37-year-old laborer, given in charge by his mother for being drunk and disorderly in her home was given a caution and was allowed to go.

A civil action for wages taken by a man named Smith against Messrs. St. George and Godden, contractors of pulpmill at Chapel's Cove, occupied the attention of the court for some time. Judgment will be delivered in a few days.

His assistant, Mr. Veitch, is now in full charge of the department.
