In the first issue of my paper, I printed special messages of greeting from the Rt. Hon. J. Ramsay Mac-Donald, Hon. William Green, President of the American Federation of Labor; Mr. Tom Moore, President of the Trades' and Labor Congress of Canada; and His Excellency, General P. E. Calles, Labor President of Mexico.

"Workingman" seeks to maintain that President Calles is a Bolshevik or Communist. Under his government says "Workingman," things have been done as bad as in Soviet Russia. ASH Wins Remarkable Brake Test in Toledo
