Continuation of the East Middlesex Association Proceedings.

TEACHERS TALK.

The Purposes and Methods of Teaching Drawing in Schools Treated by S. K. Davidson.

THE AFTERNOON SESSION. At the session of the East Middleses Teachers' Association held yesterday afternoon, Mr. W. E. Hendrie, who had been the winner of a prize offered by the Standard Dictionary Company for a method of teaching the scientific phonetic alphabet of the American Philological Association, as used in the new Standard Dictionary, illustrated by carefully-drawn charts the method of teaching words by sight to the little beginners, such words to subequently form the basis of the elementary lessons in phonics. A long discusison followed, resulting in an enlargement of Mr. Hendrie's list of words suitable

for the introduction of phonics. Mr. W. H. Liddicoatt gave an interesting treatment of the method of beginning geography and introducing the globes. He would start with the slated globe, and from it impart first notions of the round earth; then, marking on it the position of home, he would show fed, cotton seed meal, oil cake and flaxseed screenings, in equal parts, \$20 per ton. as a time of preparation for something higher. They looked forward to law, medicine or the pulpit, but it mattered not what position might be attained in future life, they would never have better opportunities to do good than when they were teachers. Touching spon the duties of teachers, Mr. Clark said it was an exceedingly important thing in every school that the person who stood behind the desk should maintain his or her authority; that the teachers should let the pupils know that they were there to rule; that they should receive the thorough respect and recognition due a teacher; and that it was no pleasure for them to cause physical pain. The president, Mr. J. W. Plewes, had said something in regard to social questions. There was no question of greater importance, and it was to be learned that whatever good was to come in the way of government must spring from the individual. It must be acknowledged that there was a good deal of wrong about the Dominion Government; there is a misuse of public funds; but it was not simply party warfare that brought these things out. Governments should be representative of the people, but just so long as there are 1. Washing off and Kalsomining stupid voters, passionate voters, men who have not the intellectual fibre that would lead them to scorn the one that 2. Painting per yard, one or two would buy a vote—until there was that class of men communities could not have pure governments. Teachers had to do with individuals at the most impressionable stage, and the things they did would have effect not only tomorrow, but for ever and ever. A personal interest must be shown in every child. Some could not help having a stronger liking for some pupils than others—the pretty little children with the golden ringlets, for instance; but, just as in precious ores and stones, behind uncomeliness there was often a true sparkle. Concluding, Mr. Clark spoke a word of encouragement, urging the teachers above all not to think that

their work was lost. A vote of thanks, accompanied by kind words from the mover, seconder, Inspector Dearness and Mr. C. B. Edwards, of the Collegiate Institute staff, was tendered the speaker of the evening, and the members of the association adjourned to the Canadian General Electric Company's power house to take

FRIDAY MORNING. The second day's proceedings of the East Middlesex Teachers' Association were opened at the county council chamber this morning. Mr. S. K. Da-vidson, instructor in drawing at the Collegiate Institute, exhaustively treated the purposes and methods of teaching drawing in public and high schools. Harm comes from the erroneous opinion that the subject is an ornamental one to enable a person to make pretty pictures to be hung up in frames. Drawing as taught in the schools is, or should be, intensely useful. He criticised the faults in the authorized books, one being the excessive guiding-line rulings in Book No. 1, and another the machine made shading in Books Nos. 5 and 6, which no one can copy free-hand. As an example of good shading he referred to that on the copy of the onion on page 7 of H. S. Book No. 1. In shading each stroke should be not more than a half-inch long; crossing lines should make acute, not right angles. Always keep pencils sharp. He distinguished mechanical from pictorial perspective, and would favor for practical purposes confining himself to the latter, which
