## Good Start.

Premier Laurier Congratulated on all Sides.

Sir Charles Tupper Says There Will be No Opposition in the Bye-Elections.

A Sequel to the Disgraceful Ballot Box Stuffing in North Ontario.

Ottawa, July 14.—The Prime Minister was seen by a correspondent shortly after the close of the ceremony, and congratulated on having formed an unprecedentedly strong Government. He replied: "I think the people of the Government will give satisfaction to the people of the Atlantic. This, however, I leave to the fair judgment of the people themselves. The only trouble I had in forming the Administration was that so many good and able men could not be taken in."

The issue of the writ for the elections made necessary by the acceptance of office by the Ministers holding portfolios and the Solicitor-General has been ordered. Nominations will take place July 20, and polling August 2.

Parliament will be prorogued till about August 19.

Mrs. Laurier, wife of the Premier, arrived last evening for a few days and was warmly greeted by old friends.

Sir Charles Tupper has canceled his projected trip to England on Wednesday. He is expected to arrive in London on Friday, and will be warmly greeted by old friends.

Asked if he would give any indication of Conservatives' intention as to bye-elections, Sir Charles Tupper last night said that, so far as he could see, there would not be much gained by offering opposition to the Ministers.

The commission to revise and consolidate the Dominion statutes has been appointed and approved by his Excellency. It will consist of Judge Baby, Mr. Emerson Coatsworth, ex-M. P., Mr. E. L. Newcombe, Deputy Minister of Justice; Mr. J. S. A. Creighton, law clerk of the Senate; Mr. F. A. McCord, law clerk, and Mr. R. V. Sinclair, Ottawa, as secretary. This order in council is not worth the paper it is written on, even with the signature of his Excellency the Governor-General, because it has already been decided in England by the highest authority that an appointment of a nature without a parliamentary appropriation is void, and in addition the revision requires an act of Parliament, and this, too, is lacking. The appointments are, and will be, void.

James Connors, who is in the city, and who was defeated by Mr. Klock in Nipissing, has decided to protest the election. The majority of Mr. Connors was about 800, but he thinks he could get over this next time, claiming that the influences which were used to return the Conservative candidate, could not be repeated with a change of Government.

East-End Col. Donville, who represents Kings, N. B., and who came here with Mr. Laurier from Montreal, has left for home. "I have had a big fight," said Mr. Donville to a reporter, "in my own constituency for the last few years, but at last I have won. I had run as a Conservative, but I have changed my mind. I have had confidence in me, and in the policy of Mr. Laurier. It was on that policy that I ran my election. I am satisfied that I have won. I have won, and I have assured him of my support."

East York section will be protested by Mr. H. R. Frankland, the Liberal candidate, who was returned for North Ontario by the clearest case of ballot-stuffing, says he will never sit for the constituency. Mr. McMillan is a Conservative.

Mr. McMillan, who is a South Essex, is only 33 years of age. He fought a hard contest in a doubtful constituency, and his majority of nearly 200 is one of the best achievements of the election in this Province.

In Macdonald, the Manitoba seat for which Mr. Boyd, Conservative candidate, was elected, Mr. Boyd polled 2,412 votes, against Mr. Brathwaite, the Liberal, 1,560, and Mr. Brathwaite, the Patron, 1,272. The majority against the Tupper Government was, therefore, 810.
