Seventy-Three Lives and \$1.50,000 Worth of Property Lost.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 23.—One of the worst storms that ever struck this part of the country has just passed over Buffalo. It swept Lake Erie from end to end and did a great deal of damage to the smaller craft.
