White's ability to pull through successfully. It is asserted that she has written to Lady White, expressing sympathy with her husband in the trials and difficulties he is now experiencing, and assuring Lady White of her undiminished confidence in his generalship. The purport of this letter has been cabled to Gen. White by the Marquis of Lansdowne.

ON THE MOVE. The most interesting news this (Thursday) morning is from Estcourt, announcing the departure of a strong force of mounted troops and artillery for a destination not given in the dis-

patch. Another message announces the arrival at Estcourt and Pietermaritz-burg, within the last few days, of the reinforcements from Durban, and that 3,500 troops are assembled, ready for a readvance to Colenso when the opportune moment arrives. The latter dispatch throws light on the former, and the force which left Estcourt Monday last doubtless occupied Colenso and probably is now advancing cautiously up the railroad towards Lady-smith, Gen. White's sortie of Friday, almost to the banks of the Tugela River, encouraging the commander, in the hope of joining hands.

It is stated, under Sunday's date, from Estcourt, that Sir George White received a message from Gen. Buller on Sunday. So far, however, no message seems to have been received from Gen. White regarding Thursday and Friday's sorties.

RAILWAY TO LADYSMITH. A special dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, dated Sunday, says: "It is confidently asserted that railway communication will be restored with Ladysmith within a few hours."

The Daily Mail has the following dispatch from Queenstown, Cape Colony, dated Sunday night: "The railway staff is withdrawing from all the border stations between this and De Aar. There is no cause for alarm, however, with reference to the border towns. Gen. Buller has taken effective steps to check the Boer advance. Censorship prevents particularizing, but you may expect extensive news soon.

BOERS GO BACK. The Boers who occupied Colengo

BOERS LOSE 1,000 MEN. London, Nov. 9.-The Times has a delayed dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, saying that the report is con-firmed that the Boers lost 1,000 men in last week's fight at Ladysmith. The check they received caused them to retreat four miles to Estcourt, Natal. The Boers were found, by an armored train, to be in force at Pieter's Station, half-way between Colenso and Ladysmith, where they had torn up the railroad track. The Boers have not made any demonstration south of Colenso. Capt. Murray, in command here, is availing himself of the delay to strongly fortify the town.

CROWDED WITH BOER PRISON-ERS. Durban, Sunday, Nov. 5 .- Other messengers convey the statement of native eye-witnesses respecting the severity f the fighting on both Friday and Saturday at Ladysmith. The natives assert that the Boers were so cut up that they howled for mercy on the field, and covered their bodies. Ladysmith is crowded with Boer prisoners and wounded, the latter presenting horrible evidence of the swordsmanship of the cavalry. The Gordon Highlanders suffered severely in the fighting.

BOERS HAVE GOOD GUNS. Estcourt, Natal, Monday, Nov. 5.— Mr. Burnard, proprietor of the Rail-way Hotel at Ladysmith, has arrived here with a companion, having eluded the Boer outposts by night, riding along Kaffir paths. He confirms the report that when Gen. White requested that the men and women be permitted to depart, Gen. Joubert replied that he would only allow them to get away under fire of his guns. Mr. Burnard views the situation gravely, and says that none of the British artillery is able to cope with the Boer siege guns.

EXTRAORDINARY WOUNDS. Cape Town, Nov. 5 .- Sir Alfred Milner visited the wounded today. They are all doing well. Some of the wounds are of an extraordinary nature. Mauser bullet makes a clean perfora-tion of bone and muscle. Soldiers shot through both cheek bones have lost the sense of smell and taste, but are otherwise quite well. Most of the wounds are in the hands and arms. The local volunteers have again ex-
