British Forces On the Move

Strong Body of Mounted Troops Leave Estcourt.

Reinforcements From Durban Reach That Place and Pietermaritzburg.

The Prospects at Mafeking Also Look Brighter.

Ladysmith Crowded With Boer Prisoners and Wounded.

Report Confirmed That the Enemy Lost 1,000 Men in Last Week's Fight at Ladysmith—Many Transports Due at Cape Town This Week.

London, Nov. 9.—It would seem now that if Gen. White could only keep the British flag flying over Ladysmith until he is relieved, the campaign will

about the middle of last week retired without damaging Bulwer bridge, over the Tugela River, or the railroad as far north as the village of Nelthorpe, seven miles south of Ladysmith. Evidently they nurse a hope of eventually using both in their descent on Pietermaritzburg. Meanwhile the British are also able to use the railway, as they have already done, in running up an armored train, which may at the present moment be covering the advance of the Estcourt force.

ESTCOURT GREATLY STRENGTHENED.

At Estcourt and Pietermaritzburg the defensive works have been greatly strengthened within the last few days, and they are now believed capable of holding their own against any Boer force which Gen. Joubert would, at the present juncture, risk sending. Both are likely to be strengthened before the week is out by a further naval force and even by the first detachment of Gen. Buller's army corps.

AT MAFEKING.

The situation looks brighter at Mafeking, where the Boers are ap-

parently disheartened at the unexpected resistance, and a large body of their force having been detached to the south to assist in the investment of Kimberley, around which the cordons are drawing tighter.

Evidently the Boers intend to make a concentrated effort to capture Kimberley and their arch-enemy, Cecil Rhodes. The reported departure of a Boer contingent from Pretoria, with German artillery gunners, moving southward, is taken to mean co-operation in the invasion of the northern portions of Cape Colony, an undertaking which, thus far, has not progressed very rapidly. Further details from Mafeking, carrying events up to Oct. 17, say: "British firing was easing off, garrison was in high spirits, and the siege was becoming a farce." Some of the people were in the habit of shouting from the housetops, "war shells," and that rabbit holes had been excavated in the town, in which the men would dive when the big gun was seen. Gen. Cronje is accused of dropping shells in the vicinity of the women's laager.

ON THE MOVE.

The most interesting news this (Thursday) morning is from Estcourt, announcing the departure of a strong force of mounted troops and artillery for a destination not given in the dispatch.

Another message announces the arrival at Estcourt and Pietermaritzburg within the last few days, of the reinforcements from Durban, and that 3,500 troops are assembled, ready for a readvance to Colenso when the opportunity moment arrives. The latter dispatch throws light on the former, and the force which left Estcourt Monday last doubtless occupied Colenso, and probably is now advancing cautiously up the railroad towards Ladysmith. Gen. White's sortie of Friday, almost to the banks of the Tugela River, encouraging the commander, in the hope of joining hands.

It is stated, under Sunday's date, from Estcourt, that Sir George White received a message from Gen. Buller on Sunday. So far, however, no message seems to have been received from Gen. White regarding Thursday and Friday's sorties.

RAILWAY TO LADYSMITH.

A special dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, dated Sunday, says: "It is confidently asserted that railway communication will be restored with Ladysmith within a few hours."

The Daily Mail has the following dispatch from Queenstown, Cape Colony, dated Sunday night: "The railway staff is withdrawing from all the border stations between this and De Aar. There is no cause for alarm, however, with reference to the border towns. Gen. Buller has taken effective steps to check the Boer advance. Censorship prevents particularizing, but you may expect extensive news soon."

Light Horse pressed too far into a gully, and were extricated by the Dragoons, all getting safely away. Under a heavy fire, Lieut. Pomeroy, of the 5th Dragoon Guards, pluckily rescued a dismounted trooper from the fire zone. The British casualties were slight. The moral effect is excellent.

AT GROBELERSKLOOF.

London, Nov. 9.—Further reports of the Grobelaerskloof affair tend to confirm the statement that the British were successful. A Kafir declares that fully a hundred Boers were killed on the hill-top by the "men-women," which is supposed to indicate that the Gordon Highlanders were there. Cyclists south have been since across the Tugela bridge. They saw a number of killed lying on the plain.

AN OPPORTUNITY LOST.

Apparently, when the Colenso garrison evacuated that place Friday, the British troops missed a grand opportunity of carrying out an effective attack on the rear of the disconcerted Boers. The latter appear to believe that the Colenso column evacuated the place as a ruse and are lying in ambush to surprise them if they advance; hence the immunity of the town from occupation by the burghers.

PIETERMARITZBURG.

Durban, Natal, Sunday, Nov. 5.—Gen. Buller, accompanied by 100 men, has arrived at Vryheid, on his way to Swaziland. It is believed he is going to Zululand.

The enrolment of the new imperial infantry is proceeding apace at Durban and Pietermaritzburg. Morris' Mounted Volunteers have left Pietermaritzburg for the Mocher River.

The preparations for the defense of Pietermaritzburg are in good shape. All the strong positions of the surrounding hills have been fortified.

The Natal volunteers are moving the guns, which are being sent by rail, to Pietermaritzburg, to assist in the defense of the latter in case of an attack.

Advices from Naumanpoort, Cape Colony, dated Monday morning, say that the Boers were relaying the rails at Norvalspont. The railway department the previous day destroyed the culvert between Arundel and Treen-dale.

BOERS LOSE 1,000 MEN.

London, Nov. 9.—The Times has a delayed dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, saying that the report is confirmed that the Boers lost 1,000 men in last week's fight at Ladysmith. The check they received caused them to retreat four miles to Estcourt, Natal. The Boers were found, by an armored train, to be in force at Pieter's Station, half-way between Colenso and Ladysmith, where they had torn up the railroad track. The Boers have not made any demonstration south of Colenso. Gen. Buller is now in a position to avail himself of the delay to strongly fortify
