Dismissing the Natal Soldiers

Buller Able to Do Without Their Services.

Regulars May Be Sent to Pekin from Durban—Other Indications That the South African Campaign is Nearing Its Close.

London, Monday, June 18—4:20 a.m.—There are some indications that Lord Roberts considers the end of the struggle in South Africa not far distant.

One of these is the fact that the Natal Volunteers, who had seen hard service, were dismissed to their homes by Gen. Buller Saturday. They were cheered as they left. Another indication is the report in authoritatively informed military circles in London that a complete division of regulars is to be withdrawn from Gen. Buller's army and embarked at Durban for China.

The troops drawn from India will probably go next. Lord Roberts let yesterday go by without telegraphing. Unofficial intelligence from Macadodorp, via Lorenzo Marquez, is to the effect that the British troops are near Middleburg.

BULLER'S COMPLAINT.
London, June 18.—The war office has received this dispatch from Gen. Buller:

"Laing's Nek, June 15.—Now that Natal is clear of the enemy I wish to call attention to the disgraceful way in which private property was treated in the part of the colony they occupied. Their willful and needless damage is visible everywhere, and houses when not completely wrecked have been desecrated with filthy ingenuity. That this has been done with the consent of leaders is proved by the fact that while in Charleston every house was wrecked in Volke's ravine, two miles off, but in the Transvaal every house intact."

A dispatch from Laing's Nek, dated today, says Gen. Christian Botha's next stand will be at Paarde Kop, but without a reduced force of 1,000 men. The German ambulance captured by Gen. Buller has been sent to Durban, whence it will be allowed to return to the Transvaal, via Delagoa Bay.

FROM ROBERTS.
London, June 16.—The war office has received the following from Lord Roberts:

Gen. Buller, I hope, is at Standerton. Heidelberg will be occupied during this place shortly, and then the Orange River Colony will be completely cut off from the Transvaal.

Baden-Powell reports that the district through which he passed is settling down satisfactorily. Over 1,000 stands of arms were surrendered, and Hans Eloff and Piet Kruger, son of the president, were to make submission to him yesterday, having been previously disarmed on their farms.

"Botha's army has retired, and is believed to be at Middleburg. His rear guard was surprised and entirely routed by Ian Hamilton's mounted infantry."

GEN. RUNDLE.
Gen. Rundle's line at Senekal and Ficksburg is now almost invulnerable. The Boers attacked Ficksburg Saturday morning, but were driven off. President Steyn, of the Orange Free State, is still trying to encourage the burghers. Gen. Dewet is trekking north of Bloemfontein.

In an attack on the railway pioneers near Zand River the Boers were driven off, but Maj. Seymour, commanding the pioneers, was killed. He was an American and was employed in the Rand.

KRUGER.
The Lorenzo Marquez correspondent of the Times says President Kruger has removed his headquarters to Alkmaar, near Nel Spruit.

Boer merchants are rushing goods towards Macadodorp, their expectation being that the use of the railway will soon be lost, and the preparations for a final stand in the Lydenburg district must be promptly completed.

A rumor is rife in the city that Lord Roberts is negotiating with President Kruger and Gen. Botha, through their wives, regarding terms of surrender.

FROM BOER SOURCES.
The Boers' report of the fighting east of Pretoria, posted on a bulletin board outside of President Kruger's car at Macadodorp, ran thus: "The commandos east of Pretoria, in the direction of Brockhurst Spruit, were compelled to retire after a fierce stand of more than two days in a way that won the admiration of the acting commandant-general. The short-range rifle fire was very hot, and for part of the second day, especially late in the afternoon, the enemy fought at a distance of 100 yards. Our loss cannot be given yet. The acting commandant-general only mentioned Field Cornet Jan Van Buren killed. He was one of the pluckiest men in the field."

Information is again to hand regarding the miserable condition of the enemy's troops that have penetrated to Johannesburg and Pretoria. They continually complain of the lack of food. Several British soldiers have died in the streets of Pretoria, of exhaustion and starvation. Along the roads are the corpses of horses and mules, while the living animals are so weak they are hardly able to carry their loads. Another bulletin at Macadodorp, according to a dispatch dated June 15, says: "Fifteen officers and

600 British soldiers, prisoners, have arrived at Standerton, Free State, bound for Noot Gedacht. Thirty burghers were killed and wounded during the last few days' fighting near Pretoria."

STEYN'S LATEST.
Mr. Steyn, in consequence of Lord Roberts' annexation of the Free State by proclamation, has issued a counter proclamation, declaring that the Free State still exists, is independent, and does not acknowledge the authority of Great Britain.

BRITISH PRISONERS SUFFER.
The British prisoners at Noot Gedacht have been having exciting games of football to keep themselves warm. They are, according to a dispatch from Lorenzo Marquez, without shelter or medical comforts, and are confined between mountains where the sun does not shine until 8:30 a.m.

CAPE TOWN CABINET.
Cape Town, June 18.—The new cabinet has been officially announced. Sir J. Gordon Sprigg is premier and treasurer; J. J. Graham is colonial secretary; Mr. Rose-Innes, attorney-general; Mr. Smart, department of public works; Sir Peter Faure, agriculture, and Mr. Frost, without portfolio.

The Situation.
ONE OF KRUGER'S SONS SURRENDERED.

London, June 17.—Isaac N. Ford, in his latest cable on the South African war, filed at 6 o'clock this morning, says: "There was little war news from South Africa yesterday, but what there was seemed favorable to the British side. Gen. Baden-Powell had reached Rustenburg, and a column was starting out from Pretoria to meet him. He will be in Pretoria before Gen. Hunter reaches Johannesburg from Potchefstroom. These two columns have proved that the Western Transvaal is a hollow shell, without resources for resisting invasion. One of President Kruger's sons has surrendered. Lord Roberts goes out of his way to explain his immediate plan of campaign. Gen. Buller has been ordered to Standerton, and Heidelberg will soon be occupied. The Boer forces in the Transvaal will then be separated from the Free State commandos and each division will be dealt with in turn. The first movement which Gen. Buller will make from Standerton will be toward Vrede, where 1,000 prisoners are confined."

CHARGES AGAINST LANDSDOWNE.
London, June 18.—Mr. Charles Williams, the military expert of the Morning Leader, accuses the Marquis of Lansdowne, secretary of state for war, of having cut out of Sir Redvers Buller's dispatches on the Spion Kop disaster the criticisms of Gen. Buller upon himself, and of having left in Lord Roberts' dispatch remarks almost identical with Gen. Buller's. He also asserts that the reason for not removing Sir Charles Warren were cut out, together with many other matter, the mutilating of the dispatches showing personal animus.

The Canadians.
EFFICIENCY OF THE MOUNTED RIFLES.

London, June 18.—Mr. H. S. White, a special war correspondent with the Canadian Mounted Rifles, writes as follows, under date of Kroonstad, May 19: "During our halt here we have heard on every hand expressions of admiration at the efficient manner in which the Canadian Mounted Rifles have performed the onerous and very dangerous work assigned them. The marvelous way in which they have gone through the heaviest rifle and shell fire without suffering any casualties is also a subject of much comment. During the week a detachment of 100 of our men from the four squadrons, under command of Capt. Chalmers, together with a squadron of the Imperial Mounted Infantry, the whole under the command of Col. Alderson, rode out over 60 miles without once off-saddling, captured 24 Boers, including a commandant, some field cornets and other officers, and returned to camp without casualties. Today the men and horses, much benefited by their long rest here, are now in a condition to stand any amount of further work and hardships."

TERSE TELEGRAMS.
Congressman John Henry Hofferker, of Delaware, dropped dead Saturday.

A deaf mute named Winterbourne was killed by a freight train near Ayr. The Ontario Deaf Mutes' Association is holding a convention at the Belleville institute.

An order for 1,000 horses for the Imperial army has been placed with an Ottawa firm.

The Ontario provincial health officer reports that the Port Arthur smallpox has been stamped out.

Yellow fever has broken out at Quemaes, eight miles from Havana, and of 14 cases three have died.
