GREAT BUSH FIRE

Lumber Mill Plant Wiped Out at Bay Chaleur.

Quebec, June 29.—Bush fires are raging in the Bay Chaleur district, and all the buildings surrounding King Bros' mills at Pabos, Gaspé, have been destroyed, including the residence of Mr. MacNaughton, manager for King Bros., and its contents, as well as the store and telegraph office adjoining. Only employees saved the extensive mills and lumber, the flames spreading with great rapidity, and leveling everything in their path. The fire is still raging, and it is feared may yet reach Newport, Gaspé, six miles distant. Mr. MacNaughton and family have been obliged to take up temporary quarters in the clubhouse on the opposite side of the river.

FRESH STATEMENT FROM DUNDONALD

Repeats Charges of Mutilation of Reports by Minister of Militia.

Ottawa, June 29.—Lord Dundonald has handed out another lengthy statement replying to the Minister of Militia's speech in the House of Commons in which he takes issue with the minister as to the charges that the scheme for militia reform would have cost hundreds of thousands of dollars, and places it at \$225,000 to \$250,000. He repeats that Sir Frederick Borden mutilated his report, and denies that he had direct intercourse with the minister, the last time they met being in March, when the minister's report was returned. Lord Dundonald also denies that Col. Roy was overlooked, as alleged by the minister. Lord Dundonald will speak at Renfrew on Friday night at a Scotch gathering. He will be presented with an address, and will doubtless make allusions to recent differences in reply, as the address is said to contain allusions to the trouble with the Government.

MANUFACTURERS APPROVE TARIFF

But Think the Anti-Dumping Regulations May Not Prevent Slaughtering.

Toronto, June 29.—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association today issued a statement regarding the Canadian tariff. The statement, which has been adopted by the association, is as follows:

First, the association commends the general tendency of the recent tariff changes inasmuch as they provide increased protection for certain Canadian industries. The association, while pleased that the Government has favorably considered the necessities of the woolen and textile industries, does not approve of the departure made by the Government in increasing the protection by decreasing the preference. Such action will be probably misinterpreted in Great Britain, whereas an increase in the regular duties on these lines would still have maintained the principle of a uniform preference for British goods.

The association, while gratified to note that the evil of dumping has been recognized by the Government, is of the opinion that it cannot be fully remedied except by increased duties in necessary cases. Certain difficulties presented by the regulations are pointed out. Some of the five hundred ports of entry in Canada, what goods are to be imported, will be required to know, and that the loss may be greater than their own would be a poor consolation. MILITIA REORGANIZATION

Domination May Be Divided in Seven Military Districts.

Toronto, June 29.—It is reported on good authority that an important scheme of military reorganization is on foot as one sequel to the dismissal of Lord Dundonald by the Canadian Government. According to an informant the intention is to divide the Dominion into seven military districts, the boundaries of which shall be co-extensive with those of the various provinces, and a local officer of high rank shall be placed in command of the militia in each Province.

In this connection, Colonel Otter is spoken of as the commander of the Ontario militia, and it is hinted that he may be made a major-general, in order to give him the requisite military status.

It is also said to be likely that major-generals will be created to fill the posts referred to in the Provinces other than Ontario.

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CELLULOID AFIRE.

New York, June 29.—Three alarms were turned in for a fire which started in the sub-cellar of No. 485 Broadway, occupied by Rice & Hochstetler, dealers in celluloid, yesterday. All the employees in the building escaped safely, but four firemen were overcome by the dense smoke.

According to the firemen's estimate, reached \$150,000. As the fire progressed, the smoke from burning celluloid became so dense, and more than a score of firemen were overcome. One of these, Captain Edward Leslie, was found in the cellar after he had been missing more than an hour, and his condition is regarded as critical.
