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own power, nor that of the boy, and
that no other method was so dangerous
or ineffectual. Many of our bad chil-
dren are temperamental or partially in-
sane. Many to some extent inherit
their evil tendencies. These should be
treated in a kindly manner, as adults
entirely insane are treated now, and
not flogged as was the way a half cen-
tury ago. Imperfect nutrition, catarrhs,
organic changes in heart and other
such causes were given as physical
reasons for the boy's badness.

Inspector compared flogging, as
means of curing a boy's sulkingness, to
a revolver being used by a photographer to
compel a smile from his subject. In-
sulting and humiliating to the boy, and
speaking enthusiastically of domestic
science and household economy, the
speaker thought that many boys get
wrong because their mother has never
learned how to cook. Imperfect nutri-

Ontario. No fair in the west, outside of
the Western, at London, has ever had
date exhibits in every class and exhibi-
tors better than the West Eight Exhi-
bition. The palace, a large and commodi-
ous building, was well filled with splen-
did displays of produce, stock, and
fruit. The apples especially were a
show in themselves. In all kinds of
roots there has been such a compe-
tition at any fair this year. And
never has a handsome lot of cattle,
sheep and swine been gathered together
under cover. The horses were also
provided with stalls this year, and the
races were also under cover—facts that
were much appreciated by the exhibi-
tors. In horses the exhibit was ahead of
any previous year.

The races were of a very exciting char-
acter, and were watched with keen in-
terest on the part of the spectators. In
the free-for-all there was especially great
competition, each side being backed by
a large number of supporters. The
track was very heavy on account of
the rain, but the animals made good
