Detroit, July 17.—Umpire Kerin's reversal of a decision he had given in the fifteenth inning caused the Detroit and Washington baseball teams to establish a world's record at Bennett's Park yesterday afternoon.

For 18 innings these two teams—the head and tail-end of the American League—battled, and at the end of this period, when darkness put an end to the struggle, the score stood 0 to 0.

The World's Record. There have been longer games played in the history of the national game than that between Champions and Senators yesterday, but none of the extreme length in which neither team scored a run.

The pitchers in the thrilling battle were Edward Summers, of Detroit, and Gray and Groom, of Washington. All three twirled magnificent ball. Gray had held the Champions to one lone hit in eight innings, that one being made by Matty McIntyre in the first inning. At the beginning of the ninth inning, Gray complained of a pain in his side. The twirler gamely tried to continue pitching, but he staggered in the box and with the cheers of the Tiger fans following him, he limped his way to the clubhouse and Groom took his place.

The latter twirled as splendidly as did his predecessor. Time and again the youngster found himself in tight places. Once he had three men on bases, none out and the heavy end of the Tiger battery facing him, yet he escaped, as the score shows, without permitting a Tiger to round the circuit.

"Eddie" Summers never pitched as he did yesterday. He was ably supported by his teammates. His feat is even greater than that of Gray or Groom, for Edward twirled 18 long innings, while the burden of the pitching was divided between two of the Washington twirlers.

Second Hit in Fifteenth.

In the fifteenth inning Stange got the second hit of the game, a single. Killifer was sent down to run for the catcher, Groom, the twirler indicated that the player was safe. To those in the stands and on the field no other decision could have been given. The players commenced to leave the field. Cushions were tossed high in the air in celebration of the overtime victory, which to the amazement of players and fans, Kerin raised his hand and pointed backward, declaring Killifer out.

Reversed Decision.

Members of both teams crowded excitedly about the umpire. Manager Jennings protested against the injustice of the decision. Kerin was asked for an explanation of his action, but the arbiter with all the authority vested in his title, waved the players aside majestically and play was resumed again.

CANADIANS CAPTURE KOLAPORE TROPHY

The Maple Leaf Riflemen at Bisley Continue Their Great Showing.

Bisley Camp, July 16.—This is the competition for the Rajah of Kolapore's Imperial Challenge Cup. The match is open to teams from the colonies, from India, of the territorial troops of the old country.

Seven shots to be fired at each of the 200, 500 and 600 yards ranges. In addition to the silver bowls for each member of the winning team, there is a colonial prize of £80, which was won last year by Canada.
