



the first journey across Africa in a motor car, is about to make a similar journey in a motor boat. He expects to start from Chinde on

miles. A kind of bicycle carriage has been constructed for the overland journey, which will enable the boat to be pushed across country with ease, even if there are no roads

The boat will then be taken down the Fife and the Chambezi Rivers to the unexplored Bangualo Lake. Lieut. Graetz states that this lake has never been traversed by a European. passed near it on his motor car journey, but the natives refused to allow him to make a voyage on the lake in a canoe, as they declared it was guarded by enormous serpents and filled with water spouts of boiling water

A careful survey of this lake is one of the objects of the expedition.
