ROYALIST STRUCK PREMIER BRIAND

French Premier Reels Under Two Blows in the Face.

Paris, Nov. 20.—Imposing national ceremonies in the Tuilleries Gardens Sunday in connection with the dedication of a statue erected to the memory of Jules Ferry, the French statesman, were marred by an assault on Premier Briand, who, while walking with President Fallieres, was struck twice in the mouth by a royalist. The premier was not seriously hurt.

The vast crowd which had gathered in the garden set on the premier's assailant and only after a determined intervention by guards saved him from being beaten to death. The incident occurred at the conclusion of the exercises, which were attended by thousands.

President Fallieres, M. Briand, and the other ministers were walking toward the statue when a man broke through the Republican Guards that lined the road, leaped to M. Briand's side, and raising his clenched fists high in the air, brought them with full force upon the premier's face.

Reels, But Does Not Fall. M. Briand, reeling under the blows, but did not fall. As friends rushed up to assist him, he cried: "I am all right; we must protect my assailant."

The very audacity of the assault rendered the crowd momentarily speechless, but a shout of anger and cries of "Kill him!" arose quickly from all sides, as men fought their way to lay hands on the assailant. He was kicked and beaten and badly injured before the Republican Guards urged on by the premier rescued him. The man was taken before a magistrate and gave the name of Lacour. He said he was a member of the executive committee of the "Camelots du Roi," an organization of young royalists, and that he wished to strike at the republic in the person of Briand.

Associates Honor Lacour. The "Camelots du Roi" met Sunday night and unanimously elected Lacour vice-president of the association in token of their sympathy and admiration of his exploit.

The statue of M. Ferry was erected by the public school children of France and the colonies, two million of whom each contributed 1 cent. The ceremonies, while honoring M. Ferry, as a statesman and upholder of the colonies, especially honored him as father of the public houses of France. A golden book, containing the names of the two million subscribers, was placed in a receptacle beneath the statue.

EMANCIPATION LODGE GETS TOGETHER AGAIN

But Under a New Name—Its Aim and Objects Seem To Be the Same.

Montreal, Nov. 19.—"I do not want to dare authority. I recognize the right of bishop or priest to defend his flock, but I certainly do deny their right to interdict anyone simply because he does not happen to attend church. We must, however, respect them."

At the conclusion of the meeting, the members adopted calling upon the mayor and aldermen to put a speedy end to the conduct of Lemieux, who was going about the city and fanning into flame the embers of the religious war.

ENGLAND IS BUYING CANADIAN FLOUR

Imports Show Big Increase in Last Few Years.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—J. M. Mussen, Canada's trade commissioner at Leeds, England, reports as follows: In the small space of three years, 1907-1909, the imports of flour into this country from the United States have fallen by no less than 2,800,000 cwt., those from Austria-Hungary by 322,000 cwt., and those from France by 189,000 cwt. While the imports from these and other countries are either stationary, or are showing a gradual decline year by year, it must be gratifying to Canadian millers to learn that on the other hand the Dominion shows a material increase, having risen from 1,430,420 cwt. in 1907 to 2,059,400 cwt. in 1909.

It is most interesting to observe the increasing popularity in this district of Canada's native game of lacrosse, which is now regularly played each week-end by numerous city and suburban clubs. That the game is being taken up in earnest is shown by the fact that lacrosse sticks are now taking a prominent place in the shops of local outfitters. In this connection it is gratifying to see the goods made by an Ontario firm well in evidence.

PERFECT SKELETONS OF THE STONE AGE

Prehistoric Human Remains of Priceless Value, Found in Bedfordshire.

London, Nov. 20.—A remarkable discovery of the skeletons of a man and woman belonging to the stone age, which antiquarians consider of priceless value, has just been made at Ainstock, in Bedfordshire. Some workmen were laying a conduit near the line of the Great Northern railway, when they came across the skeletons. They were examined by Dr. Waddell, a well known antiquary, who at once gave it as his opinion that they belonged to the neolithic period and were of great importance to the world of science.

The male is believed to have been a chieftain, and he must have been a man of magnificent physique, as the skeleton measured six feet six inches, while the head is massive. The woman was laid at right angles to the man, with her feet resting against the side of his body. Apparently when he died she had been slain and buried with him, according to prehistoric custom. Both skeletons are complete and in a good state of preservation, due to the nature of the soil. There ultimate resting place will in all probability be the British Museum.

London, Nov. 20.—Has William R. Hearst, owner of the New York American and other yellow papers in the United States, at last entered English journalism by the back door?

For some years there have been persistent reports that he would establish a newspaper in London, and recently he was in this city, and the report was revived. Now the Weekly Budget, a small publication published in a back street of London, has suddenly changed its form and makes its appeal to the public dressed in many of the familiar journalistic clothes which have become identified with the American editor's name.

Possibly, if Hearst is really behind the Weekly Budget, it is being used as a feeder. The British public is a difficult thing to gauge, and even a Hearst might be doubtful of his ability to guess what it will like. The Weekly Budget publishes the different Hearst features and a careful note is made of the way in which they are received by the readers. This is no very difficult matter because the English readers of a newspaper are constant correspondents and freely express their opinions to the editors of the papers they read.

When Harnsworth advertised that there would be a Sunday edition of the Daily Mail no less than 200,000 protests were received from readers. The editors of the paper they read, the project was abandoned. Harnsworth knew his public, however, and quietly bought up the Weekly Dispatch, which was being published on Sunday and put his ideas into that. The British public never made a protest.

A glance over the Weekly Budget reveals the New York American humor in color. This must be printed in New York and shipped over here, because the newspaper color press has not yet made its appearance in London. Besides the Crippen confession, there are several of the American magazine section features which are very evidently sent across the Atlantic in matrix form. The Lina Cavalieri beauty hints, which have long been appearing in New York, occupy the back page, and Arthur Brisbane, Dorothy Dix, and Beatrice Fairfax are on hand to tell us how to glide through life without the customary bumps and jolts.

There is considerable prejudice in England against the Americans and American schemes. Possibly Hearst figures on disarming this feeling by entering the field in stocking feet, so to speak.

16, there was a sudden rise in the tide of the Ganges, and the pilgrims were stranded on the spot where they were encamped, which has now become an island surrounded by deep water. The pilgrims who had the presence of mind to link arms and stand up, though immersed chest deep in water, were saved, but those who ran panic-stricken to regain terra firma fell into the deepest stream and were lost.

Rescue parties, headed by the deputy collector of the locality and the police, arrived on the scene as soon as possible, and with the aid of boats and an elephant rescued the stranded pilgrims.

An account given of the work done by an elephant, named Jung Bahadur, is most interesting. Jung Bahadur belongs to a race named Koor Jawsant Singh, who was on a visit to the fair, and his presence was providential. With ropes attached to his trappings the elephant repeatedly swam out to the distressed pilgrims, who were clinging on to the ropes and he landed in safe places. It is estimated that this noble animal saved at least a thousand lives.

The number drowned is put down at about two hundred or even less, but as the pilgrims had thronged from all parts of India it is impossible to say how many were really drowned. The collector of Etah and his officers did all they possibly could to help the pilgrims in their misfortune.

WILL TAKE CENSUS OF ALL MANUFACTURES

Important Investigation Will Be Made of the Various Industries.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—On the first of June next year a census will be taken of the manufactures of Canada. It will ascertain the capital employed in works in 1910, together with the value of land, buildings and plant, the kind or class of products of the works by quantity or number of finished articles and their value in the year. These statistics will relate generally to factories employing five hands or more during the year, but in such industries as flour and grist mills, brick works, saw and shingle mills, electric light and power plants, and a few others where the value of products is large in proportion to the number of persons employed, returns will be required without regard to the number of employees.

The employees of work will include managers, superintendents, etc., on salaries; officers, clerks, etc., on salaries; operatives or workers classed as over and under 16 years on wages; and piece-workers employed outside of the works. Salaries, wages and payments to all officers and employees will be entered on the schedule for the census year by sex, and will include the aggregate wages employed in the year, average hours of working time per week, and aggregate wages paid to them in the year. The aggregate weeks of time, and the aggregate wages paid to them in the year, while the average hours of working time will refer to an average computed for all employees in the year for one week only.

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The census of the dairy industry, relating to the production of butter, cheese, and condensed milk, will be taken on schedule No. 12, and will show for each kind of product its quantity and selling value, and the quantity of milk and cheese used for conversion at the factories, the number of patrons, and the amount of money distributed to them in the year.

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
