ELECTRIC RATES WERE FIXED IN ST. MARYS

Light, Heat and Power Commission Received Petition From Citizens Regarding Matter.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Marys, March 5.—At the regular meeting of the water, light and heat commission, Auditors W. F. Kanpier and Peter Munnoch presented their report for 1911, and suggested that a better system of bookkeeping be adopted, as many items of expenditure were mixed up and wrongly placed, making it difficult to understand.

Accounts amounting to \$352.68 were passed.

A large petition from electric light users was presented to the board asking that the present system of rates be retained.

A resolution was passed to have all accounts written in future instead of given verbally.

Commissioner Currie stated that as far as he could ascertain the operating expense for the past year was \$28,000, and it looked like a deficit of \$4,000.

Commissioner Currie moved the following new schedule of rates for electric light, which was passed, Mayor Sanderson dissenting.

"That the floor rate for private residence shall be 4 cents per 100 square feet, and in connection with the floor space the meter rate shall be 6 cents per kilowatt. The straight meter rate shall be 10 cents per kilowatt per meter reading, and in connection with which there shall be a minimum rate of 50 cents per month.

"Commercial lighting, when amount of current used is up to or beyond installed capacity. The installed capacity rate shall be 12 cents per kilowatt on the actual capacity installed based on one hour per day for 25 days in month. The balance of the current, after deducting the installed capacity, shall be charged at the rate of 7 cents per kilowatt, when amount used not up to installed capacity, at rate of 12 cents per kilowatt for current consumed.

"Any customers increasing their installation without advising the board of commissioners or superintendent shall be subject to the penalties ruling in connection with non-payment of light bills. All bills, private and commercial, paid on or before 15th of month, shall be subject to a discount of ten per cent. All bills not paid as above shall be net. Customers choosing either of above systems for private lighting must continue consecutively for one year before they will be changed on to the other."

STROKE WAS FATAL TO BRUSSELS PIONEER

James Wilkinson, Aged Eighty, Died at His Home After a Brief Illness.

FEBRUARY BROKE ALL KINCARDINE RECORDS

Interesting Observations on the Weather Conditions Made By Mr. William Welsh.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Kincardine, March 4.—Mr. William Welsh, who, in the absence of a regular meteorological bureau, makes regular observations of the weather conditions here, and has done so for many years past, states that the mercury reached the lowest point last month that he has ever known.

Seven years ago, according to Mr. Welsh's records, the thermometer dropped to 22 degrees below zero, but on Feb. 10 last all records were smashed, when 29 degrees below was registered.

"Last month," said Mr. Welsh to The Advertiser, "along the lake was very severe and stormy, and temperatures varied a great deal within short distances. On the 26th and 27th of February the thermometer ranged from 10 to 25 degrees, comparatively pleasant throughout, while to the east and north of Kincardine, about 30 miles, strong winds, with snow and drift, prevailed, roads and railways were blocked up, and it was said by some who experienced it to be the worst storm of the season.

"In ordinary years, thermometers registered as much of Kincardine from 10 to 15 or more degrees below, at a distance of forty miles from the lake, while this year, there are only a few degrees of difference.

"The only reason I can give for such a difference is that the vast body of fresh water to the west modifies the climate so much, that while the lake remains open, the thermometer seldom reaches zero. When it becomes frozen ten or fifteen miles out, the atmosphere is not warmed to the same extent as otherwise, and we have nearly the inland temperature.

"When upon the matter of temperature, it may not be amiss to mention that for many years I have been advocating the planting of fruit, even to that of the peach. The above temperature would rather debar the planting of this tender fruit, if it is true that it will not stand a lower temperature than 20 degrees below zero.

"I claim, however, that winter frosts do not kill the peach, and that properly matured buds are proof against the severest frost encountered here. There are two kinds, adapted to certain localities, which should be planted, to the exclusion of others, and kinds that are not likely to start a growth with the genial heat of the March and April sun. This condition is more responsible for winter-killing than that of severe frost. This condition of activity in the bud growth, and the flow of sap between the bark and the wood, followed by severe frosts at night is a prolific source of injury to the peach crop, and to our harder fruits.

"As a remedy for this condition, I would advise whitewashing, which can be easily done at all seasons of the year. This coating of whitewash reflects the heat of the sun, and retards the opening of the bud for many days."

MANY DID NOT VOTE ON CHURCH UNION

Vote of Paisley Presbyterian Stands 106 for the Proposals and 41 Against.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Paisley, March 4.—The result of the vote taken on church union in Knox Presbyterian Church has been announced as follows: Session, 7 for, 2 against; communicants, 96 for, 39 against; adherents, 10 for, 2 against; total, 106 for, 41 against.

The pastor said that for some reason or other at all seasons of the year, the vote of a membership of 328, only 147 polled their votes.

A RECORD CUT

Elm Log Brought Into Wingham Made 1,850 Feet of Lumber.
