#### Unionist Member Suspended.

The House was in a continuous uproar after the two party leaders had spoken, and the speaker was compelled to suspend Sir William Bull, of the Unionist side, for applying the word "traitor" to Premier Asquith,

Sir Rufus Isaacs, the attorney-general, attempting to carry on the discussion, met with such disorder that his words were inaudible, and the speaker was forced to suspend the eitting for an hour.
