


LONDON WON A LACROSSE CHAMPIONSHIP 40 YEARS AGO; AFTER ANOTHER NOW

Local Team Will Meet Weston in Semi-Finals at Tecumseh Park on Saturday in What Should Be the Best Game Ever Seen in This City-Club Deserves Support of Local Fans. BY BERT PERRY.]

Arrangements have been completed by the London baseball club and the London lacrosse club for the use of Tecumseh park for Saturday's lacrosse game between London and Weston. Manager Mike Collins, of the lacrosse club, stated last evening that playing in Tecumseh park will give the London team better chance to win against the visiting aggregation, as the ground is much harder there than on the Queen's park oval, where the soil is very sandy, and consequently slower and much harder to play on. The players held a practice in the West London ball yard last week, and the difference in the two grounds was noted immediately. Besides, Tecumseh park is more level and more suitable in the matter of accommodation. With fine weather one of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a lacrosse game in this city should turn out. The London team is the best that Western Ontario has turned out in recent years, and it is deserving of all the support London fans can give it. This city has been a back number in lacrosse circles for some years, but the efforts of E. H. Johnston, Mike Collins and others have been instrumental in bringing about a revival. This is the second season the London Lacrosse club has been in operation, but despite the fact that a winning aggregation has been put in the field, it has been a losing season financially. The men behind the club are in it. for the sport there is in the game. They are all old lacrosse players themselves and they are digging down into their pockets to put the game on a firm footing here. A winner was needed to do this, and they went and got a winner. Now it is up to to the fans to show a little appreciation. The Weston club, which plays here Saturday is one of the strongest intermediate aggregations that has been turned out in or around Toronto, and Saturday's game should be well worth seeing. The local players have been practicing every night this week in preparation, and they are out to land the silverware. Hanover, Fergus and other papers have commented most favorably on the London team and these towns that have been playing the game for years are in a position to judge. Weston is bringing a number of rooters down Saturday, and a big effort will be made to win this game. If the locals can run up a three or four goal lead on the Weston team here, they are confident of holding this lead when the return game is played the following Saturday. The game here will start sharp at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon

It is forty years since London won a lacrosse championship. In those days, way back in 1874, lacrosse was played a little differently from the present day manner of playing it. but it was just as strenuous and the rules have not changed much. In this year London had a particularly strong team. There were a number of good lacrosse teams in Canada in those days, and there were a few good teams in the States also. One of these was the Ononadaga club, Cleveland, which was largely made up of Canadian players. This team and the London Victorias, the name of the local team, played off for the championship, after beating all the other clubs, and a battle royal ensued. The Victorias won but the score has been forgotten. It was close at any rate. Among the players who played on this winning aggregation were H. Salter, James Barr, Thomas Hooper, John Conroy, Angus McKay, Alf. Holman, ex-Ald. James Vining, James MacGuire, M. Hunt, and Dr. Springer. Many old residents of this city will remember this team and the men who played on it.

The local rugby situation has not improved any this past week. No effort has been made to re-organize the London club and nothing has been heard as to the intentions of the University. "Cap." Stevens is still in Port Arthur, but he is expected home in a few days and, no doubt, after he arrives, things will begin to hum. In the meantime, Sarnia and Petrolea are busy at practice, and in a week or two the teams in these towns will be ready to play the district games. It is not likely the schedule for this district will open until the middle of October. It has been late in opening in the past, and the delay in getting the local club together will probably prevent an earlier opening. Last year the final game in the district was played here with Petrolea on November 8.

With a clear lead of five games, the Boston Braves have apparently sewed up the National league pennant for this season. The Giants have been shut-out in their last two games, and Boston keeps right on winning without any sign of the blow-up that John McGraw and a few other wise ones predicted. Yesterday, Christy Mathewson, the Old Master, the main-stay of the New York pitching staff for years, was knocked out of the box in one inning by the Chicago Cubs who scored five runs. There is tragedy in this. In his long diamond career, the number of times Mathewson has been knocked out of the box in the first inning could be counted on the fingers of one hand. It now looks as if "Big Six" has broken under the strain of trying to keep the Giants on top. When the Braves started to press the Giants, and McGraw's team started to slip a great deal of the pitching fell upon Mathewson and Tesreau, the only two members of the staff who were showing anything. Marquard and Demaree had been losing regularly nearly all season, and the recruit hurlers had not sufficiently developed to be of much use. When the Braves became real contenders, Mathewson and Tesreau went to McGraw and asked to be allowed to work every third day. They realized that the chance to win the pennant and to get into the world series lay in their ability to win games. Now it would seem as though the work has been too much for the man that has been the pitching marvel of the diamond for years. With him out of it, the Giants' chances are not worth considering. It will likely be a procession for the balance of the season with the Braves trotting home easy winners. The Giants will find it hard to keep in second place.

President Fitzgerald, of the Canadian league, is out with a denial to the rumor that the Toronto club will not be represented in the Canadian league next season. "Fitz" says the Beavers will be back and the only team to drop out will be Erie. Owner George O'Neill will merely take the Erie franchise and place it in some Canadian city, where Canadian league baseball is more a ruling today by President B. B. One of the directors has announced that he is through with baseball for all time to come, and he doesn't care if another game is played in this city. He is apparently eager to get out of it, and it is likely, his share in the club will be taken over by the other men interested. The London directors have been unjustly "panned" by the fans this season, because of losing the pennant. They claim that "Doc." Reisling had a free hand in everythink, and he was at liberty to strengthen the team in any way he thought advisable. However, Reisling believed he could pull through with the players he had, and had his catching department not fallen lown miserably toward the last, he likely would have landed the pennant, Lordon's slump was largely due to the poor catching. 
