

BOOST FOR LONDON, ADVISES LIONS' VICE

Emery Hamilton Addresses
Local "Cubs" At Weekly
Dinner.

"Let everyone try and get away from that pessimistic attitude. Let everyone boost," appealed Emery Hamilton, vice-president of the Lions Club of London, speaking to the members of that organization at their weekly gathering and dinner at the Tecumseh House Thursday evening. Consider some of the larger cities, Toronto, Montreal, Chicago and so on. What is one of the first characteristics that you cannot help but notice in the inhabitants there? I'll tell you. The Chicago people are all for Chicago. The Toronto people are for Toronto every minute of the day. People cannot see a better place than Montreal. And rightly so. Let Londoners boost for London. This helps not a little."

September 22 was selected at last night's meeting as charter night. This event will be marked by an unusual attendance, including visiting Lions and Tail-twisters from Hamilton, Chatham, Toronto and other of the larger and older dens of cubs.

Strongly Pro-British.
As the name signifies, the Lions Clubs are primarily British, although the most cordial relations between the empire and the neighboring republic are sought by means of the many Lions on the other side of the boundary line. A definite program of welfare work will be outlined in due course by this, the youngest of London's social organizations, and many valuable suggestions were advanced last evening. Members were especially in accord with the proposal that institutions like the Byron Sanatorium and the Westminster Hospital be selected as one outlet at least for the social and helpful activities of the cubs, directly they have completed their charter preliminaries and are "away to a good start."

Efforts Appreciated.
As a number of the cubs pointed out, there is still a good field of endeavor along this line, in aid of the different women's and other bodies already engaged in the same work to no small degree. Brief periods judiciously devoted to the benefit of the many civil and soldier patients of these institutions are greatly appreciated—to a greater degree usually than is realized by most persons.

After appearing before different associations in Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, Frederic N. Witte, vice-president of the National Surety Company of New York, will address the London Lions at the Tecumseh House Aug. 22.

YOUNG FOREST FIRE IN ST. MARYS HEDGE

Peculiar Blaze Set Fire To
Roof of House Also.

ST. MARYS, Aug. 4.—The Stone Town had its third fire within a week tonight, and the latest blaze was an unusual one. Around the home of M. Sinclair on Widdow street, is a big hedge of cedar trees. Someone, it is believed, either threw a match or a cigar stub into one of the trees, and in a few seconds a young forest fire was in progress. The flames destroyed the entire hedge and so fiercely did the trees burn that the roof of the fine residence nearby caught, and also a corner of the woodshed. The fire department was on hand quickly, however, and soon extinguished the blazing roof.

HANOVER WOMAN LOST ARM IN ACCIDENT

Mrs. Henry Seip Is Expected
To Recover From
Injuries.

HARRISTON, Aug. 4.—Two serious auto accidents occurred at almost the same spot on the Elora road, a suburb of town this afternoon. About 3 o'clock a car, driven by W. Walker of Guelph, struck some loose gravel near Cosswood and overturned. Mr. Walker had his wrist badly cut and suffered severe bruises. The car was considerably damaged.

About an hour later a coupe, driven by Edward Seip of Hanover, overturned. Mrs. Seip, mother of the driver had her arm fractured and it was so badly crushed that it had to be amputated just below the elbow. Mr. Seip was taking his mother to Kitchener, after having passed the last of four in a row. A new car, owned and driven by Jacob Hammer of Kitchener, after having passed the first three cars, ran into the coupe and overturned it. Mrs. Seip, who is 73 years of age, will probably recover. A third accident occurred in the evening, when two buggies collided just north of the overhead bridge. Mart Fulton was the driver of one, and Dave Patman of the other. The Fulton buggy sustained a broken wheel. The other was not badly wrecked.

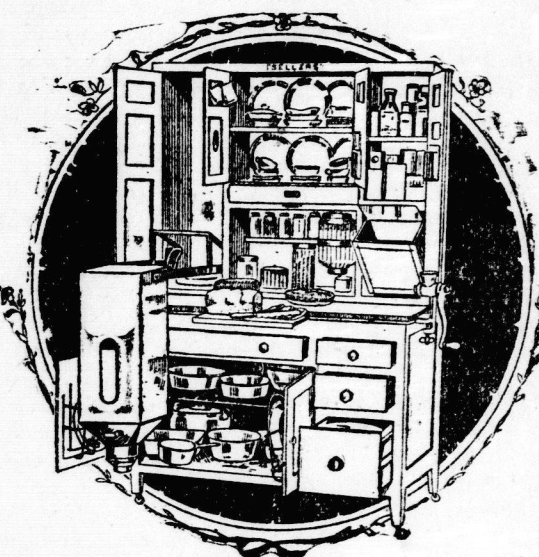
