Lloyd Houlding Named Instructor of New Public Speaking Course.

FREE TO TUXIS GROUPS

As a complement to the work in public speaking being contemplated by the public schools, the Y. M. C. A. boys' division has organized a senior class of boys for training in public speaking. The class begins Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock in the Y. M. C. A. building. The class is made up of 24 Tuxis boys from the 24 groups in the city. Each group is entitled to one representative.

Lloyd Houlding, B.A., will be the instructor. Mr. Houlding has had three years' tuition in public speaking under Professor Kirkpatrick of Toronto.

The study course will be that prepared by the Y. M. C. A. United Schools and will be given free to the Tuxis boys. The Tuxis boys will consider a city-wide movement in debating. Already three Tuxis groups have taken the initial steps of arrangements. St. Paul's, "Etimus," First Methodist, "Sawastikas," and St. Andrew's "Mie Macs."

"Debating and public speaking, with practice, develops a type of citizenship which will have self-confidence, knowledge of democratic government, and ability to stand up on a platform and express the rights of the people with no uncertain tongue," stated Mr. Houlding, in speaking of the new class.

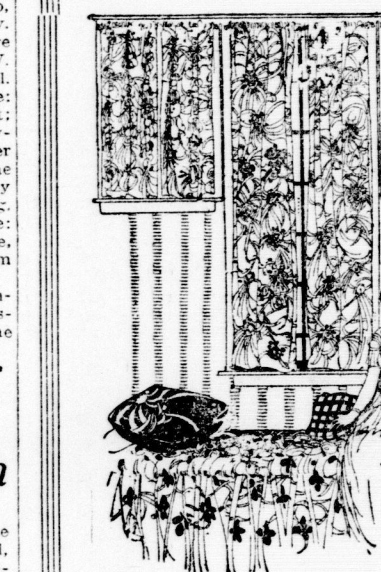
