DETROIT POLICE CONTINUE PROBE INTO ROBBERY

Not Yet Convinced That London Women Were Implicated in Theft of Clothes.

NO CHARGES LAID

Detroit, Sept. 10.—Police headquarters have yet to fix responsibility for the robbery here last month of the Wardrobe Exchange. The advertiser was informed today. While several suspects have been under arrest, including certain former Londoners, all said to be pals of "Casey" Voss, also of that city and now awaiting trial for murder, no formal charge has been evidently laid against any one person.

Investigations are still in progress, it was learned today and from all reports the local authorities have not yet been convinced that the stolen property, or at least a portion of it, had been taken to Canada.

To The Advertiser today Mrs. Voss, 52 Peterboro street, joint proprietor of the Wardrobe Exchange, explained that the police are still investigating, but that no further arrests have been accomplished. Mrs. Voss contemplated seeking the assistance of the police of London, Hamilton and other cities upon the hope that there was some truth in the report over the week-end that an attempt had been made to sell stolen goods in Canada.

Mrs. Voss sets her loss at about \$2,500. Her establishment was robbed in August of ladies' outer garments of that value, dresses, capes, coats, riding habits, etc.

When the local detectives apprehended "Casey" Voss of London, Canada, and his accomplice, George Savelli, for the robbery of a Grand Boulevard gas station, and the shooting of Floyd Johnson, the attendant, they felt that they would also solve the Exchange robbery. Several others were subsequently arrested, all suspected with implication in this and a score of other burglaries and "stick-ups."

PINCHOT TO PROTECT PUBLIC ON COAL PRICE

Governor Will Act To Prevent Gouging of Consumer on Wage Increase.

Harrisburg, Pa., Sept. 10.—Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania today assured the consumers of anthracite coal there will be no gouging of the public as a result of the strike settlement giving miners a 10 per cent wage increase if he can prevent it.

He has asked President Coolidge to aid through the Inter-State Commerce Commission and the United States Coal Commission.

Pinchot suggests a revision of rates of coal-carrying railways to absorb 40 cents increase per ton, and making public the findings of the coal commission on profits and cost in mine operation. A conference of governors of the anthracite consuming states would be called by Governor Pinchot for the purpose of finding a means to prevent extortion of middlemen.

GRAIN GROWERS REACH AGREEMENT ON POOL

Arrange For Basis On Which Wheat Will Be Handled.

Winnipeg, Sept. 9.—Complete agreement has been reached by the Alberta and Saskatchewan wheat pool representatives with the United Grain Growers, Ltd., and the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, as to the basis on which pool wheat will be handled, according to an announcement made this afternoon by Hon. Geo. E. Langley, president of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, who acted as chairman of a joint meeting considering the question here Saturday.

No information was given out as to the basis of the agreement.

USE PRECAUTIONS TO PREVENT COAL FAMINE IN CANADA

Fuel Commissioners of Dominion Making Thorough Investigation Into Conditions.

TEST BY-PRODUCT

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Canada will not suffer a coal shortage this winter if anything is to be gained by effort to avert it on the part of fuel officials.

For some time past two separate and distinct bodies of investigators have been working on the matter of the Canadian fuel supply in close co-operation with the government. The federal committee has been working in conjunction with the provinces, and municipalities on the problem of an immediate supply of fuel, while the Dominion Fuel Board has been investigating and testing substitutes for anthracite coal.

The Dominion Fuel Board has been conducting an exhaustive inquiry into the feasibility of erecting by-product recovery coke ovens in some of the largest cities.

Gas companies, coal dealers, coal producers, transportation officials and the consuming public had all taken a deep interest in the idea of by-product coke oven plants and financial circles in Montreal and Toronto are understood to be awaiting with interest the final report of the fuel board.

GREECE AND ALBANIA NOW AT LOGGERHEADS

Relations Between Countries Strained Over Responsibility of Jamaica Assassinations.

Athens, Sept. 10.—Relations between Greece and Albania are strained as a result of an attempt by the Greek Government to fix the blame for the Janina assassinations upon Albanians.

The Albanian Government has communicated with Greek authorities at Epirus forbidding Greeks to enter Albania, even if they have passports.

Greece has demanded that Albania hand over those responsible for the slaying of the Italian commissioners at Janina within five days from last Saturday.

At the same time, the Greek Government has accepted without reserve the stipulations of the ambassadors' council holding her responsible for the assassinations which occurred on Greek territory. Greece will apologize to Italy and bury the victims, meanwhile seeking to pin the crime on Albanians.
