FIVE THROUGH STREETS FOR MOTORISTS NAMED

City Council Traffic Committee To Ask Department On Ruling.

URGED BY ALD. TOWE
Waterloo, King, Stanley, Queen's Ave. and Wharncliffe Road Designated.

Five "through" streets for motorists were designated at yesterday's session of the city council's traffic committee, as urged by Ald. Allan Towe, chairman—Waterloo, King and Stanley streets, Queen's avenue and the Wharncliffe road.

The provincial department of highways will be again asked to submit a ruling as to the city's right to institute this procedure, and outline what action is necessary, if any. It is recalled that "through" streets were designated in Hamilton and Windsor only after bitter fights in the council, and with the concentrated support of the press. The contemplated revision of the traffic ordinances was left in abeyance until another session next week, as were several complaints in connection with the parking regulations.

While no definite action was ordered, the committee favored the suggestion that warning cards be furnished to hand to motorists guilty of petty infractions of the traffic regulations.

Motorists are urged to make greater use of the city market for parking purposes, under the supervision of Market Clerk Maker.

Ald. John Anderson was also nominated as chairman, retiring, however, in favor of Ald. Towe.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH LEAGUE OPPOSES CHANGE

Strong Resolution Passed Condemning Any Alteration in Temperance Act.

MRS. YOUNG SPEAKS

Voicing whole-hearted belief in the good which has come as a result of the Ontario temperance act, the Young People's League of the First Methodist Church, at their regular meeting this week, drafted and unanimously passed a resolution which opposes government sale and any movement to do away with the act now on the statute books. In full, the resolution reads:

"Belonging as most of us do, to a generation that has known little of the old-time bar, we cannot perhaps fully appreciate the change that has come over our province since 1916, but even the remnants of the traffic, as we now see them, are sufficiently evil and demoralizing to make every right-thinking, patriotic citizen determined that what has been cast out shall never return and that the present lack of rigid enforcement must cease. Therefore, be it resolved that should there be any effort to repeal or modify the O. T. A., we members of the First Methodist Church Young People's League pledge ourselves to give of our best to retain this righteous and valuable law. Further, be it resolved, that we stand as unanimously opposed to any form of government sale. Signed on behalf of the Young People's League of First Methodist Church.

The expression of this unanimous sentiment on the part of the young people came as the result of an address given by Mrs. W. G. Young, and in which she deplored propaganda of the present time, which she said, was aimed directly at the removal of the Ontario temperance act from the statute books of the province. Mrs. Yorkie Miller also spoke on this theme.

Prior to this feature of the evening's business, there was a brief program, which included readings by Miss Lyla Grant, a solo by Miss Winnifred Mack, and the reading of the Bible lesson by Mr. Ralph Presgrave.

HEROINE AT 104 YEARS.

New York, Feb. 20.—Mrs. Ettie Tupper, 104 years old, was the heroine of a recent fire in the hospital of the Sons and Daughters of Israel, a home for the aged. She prevented a serious panic among the inmates by going through the wards and assuring them they were in no danger. Ten helpless paralytics lay on their cots on the top floor of the four-story building. Firemen arrived in time to prevent the flames from spreading.

MAH JONG IS BANNED.

Philadelphia, Feb. 20.—Mah Jong gambling has been banned in the local Chinatown by order of the police. Reports of heavy losses through gambling on the game and seizures of a number of sets alleged to have been used for gambling brought about the edict.

ROBBERY STUNT FAILS.

New York, Feb. 20.—Joseph R. Woolsey, nineteen, an \$18-a-week Federal Reserve Bank messenger, found of detective stories, told the police yesterday he was held up and robbed of \$500.38 belonging to the bank. Later, detectives say, he took the money out of his left shoe in the police station.

TURKS MUST SERVE.

Constantinople, Feb. 20.—The military service bill has been approved by the national assembly. It establishes compulsory military service for all men. One and a half years is required for the infantry; two years for the artillery, cavalry, air force and engineers, and four years for the navy.

FALLS TWO STORIES.

New York, Feb. 20.—Confined to her bed more than a week by a gripe and becoming delirious, Mrs. Cecelia

Zangrando of Raritan, N.J., 84, got up and walked out of her bedroom window, falling two stories to the frozen ground, twenty feet below. She struck a wire clothesline in her descent. She got up, walked back upstairs and got in bed again. No bones were broken, but Mrs. Zangrando was severely bruised.

SIX ARE SERVED WELL.

New York, Feb. 20.—The Cunard Anchor liner Assyria on her last voyage brought only six cabin passengers, whose wants were supplied by 24 stewards. The tipping average was low.

DOUBLE DOG POPULATION.

Vienna, Feb. 20.—A dog census of this city discloses the curious fact that Vienna today shelters about twice as many of these animals as before the war, or 91,000 against 45,000 in 1912.

CASH, \$4; OWES, \$203,005.

New York, Feb. 20.—A bank account of \$4, household goods worth \$150 and \$30 cash on hand as assets and \$203,005 as liabilities are scheduled in a voluntary petition in bankruptcy which has been filed in United States district court by Berkeley C. Sexton, Wall street promoter and investor. Friends said Sexton lost nearly \$1,000,000 in the post-war slump.

LACKED EXPERIENCE.

Buffalo, N.Y., Feb. 20.—Patrolman James Cunningham proved in court that he was a scrupulous observer of the Eighteenth Amendment, and lost a case thereby. The patrolman testified that he had gone to a Michigan avenue address and demanded "a shot of gin."

"Were you served with gin?" asked the defence.

"I don't know," answered Cunningham. "I never had a drink of liquor in my life."

"Discharged," announced the commissioner. "The officer cannot qualify as an expert."

EGYPTIAN GARB GARBLED.

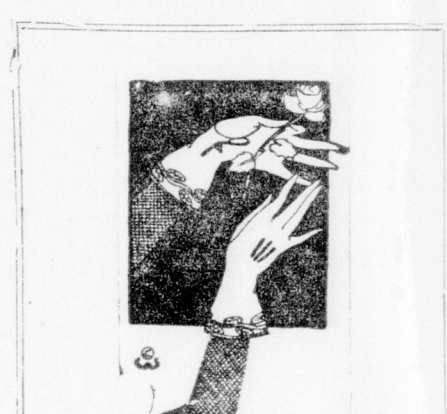
