New York, June 30 .- The bark Athena which arrived last night from Windsor, N. S., had among her crew two seamen. Harry Williams and Geo. Walker, who were part of the crew of the Norwegian bark Nordcap, which was burned at sea on June 9th. The Nordcap left Laguna, West Indies, on May 6th, with a cargo of cotton and cedar wood. She was commanded by Capt. Nielsen, and had a crew of 19 men. On June 7th, when off the Grand Banks on her way to London and Christiansund, she encountered rough weather.
