BURNED AT SEA.

A Bark Knocked About by a Storm and
Finally Destroyed by Fire.

The Crew's Desperate Fight With
the Flames—Six Lives Lost.

New York, June 30.—The bark Athena,
which arrived last night from Windsor, N.
S., had among her crew two seamen, Harry
Williams and Geo. Walker, who were part
of the crew of the Norwegian bark Nord-
cap, which was burned at sea on June 9th.
The Nordcap left Laguna, West Indies, on
May 6th, with a cargo of cotton and cedar
wood. She was commanded by Capt.
Nielsen, and had a crew of 19 men. On
June 7th, when off the Grand Banks on
her way to London and Christiansund, she
encountered rough weather. A fierce gale
knocked her about during that day, and at
night a high sea boarded the vessel, smash-
ing the wheel house and swept one of the
crew overboard. On the morning of the
9th, Second Officer Orloff discovered
fire in the cotton in the hold.
The crew were aroused, and fought
heroically against the spread of the fire.
The flames shot upward, and enveloped
the rigging and mast. The yard arm of
the mizzenmast fell and killed two of the
crew. The flames rapidly spread, and the
captain, realizing the hopelessness of longer
fighting against them, gave orders to clear
away the boats. Just then the mizzen-
mast fell and knocked three of the crew
into the sea. The others finally got away
in the boats, and were adrift for four days,
when they were finally picked up by the
Norwegian bark Agatha, from London.

BEATEN BY BURGLARS.

The Postmaster of Port Robinson
in a Dying Condition.

Port Robinson, Ont., June 30.—About
three o'clock burglars made an attempt to
enter the general store of S. B. Bennett, of
this place. They first tried to gain access
by way of the cellar. Failing in this they
turned their attention to the front windows
of the store, where they would have suc-
ceeded had it not been for the timely ar-
rival of James McCoppen, postmaster and
custom officer, on the scene, who, it is sup-
posed, rushed at the villains and was
pounced on by them and beaten so badly
that it is thought he was left for dead.
Mr. McCoppen was discovered by his wife
and daughter lying at his hall door in an
unconscious condition, in which state he
still is. As far as known little hopes are
entertained of his recovery.

THE QUEBEC CABINET.

A New Aspirant for the Vacant
Portfolio.

Montreal Q., June 30.—It is stated that
the Hon. Mr. Joly, ex-Premier of Quebec,
will join Mr. Mercier's Cabinet in place of
Col. Rhodes, and that the local member
will resign in favor of Mr. Joly.
Should this arrangement be carried out it
will meet with the approval not merely of
the Liberals and Protestants of this Pro-
vince, but with that of a large portion of
the Conservatives and Bleus.

Quebec, June 30.—Mr. Chas. Langlier
was duly sworn President of the Council
in place of Hon. H. Mercier, who assumes
the duties of Commissioner of Agriculture
pro tem., vice Col. Rhodes, who has re-
tired to private life. It is generally thought
that this arrangement is not decisive, and
that another will take place later on. The
following gentlemen were sworn in office
to day by Lieutenant-Governor Anger:—
Hon. H. Mercier, Duhamel, Garneau,
Shehyn, Marchand, and Mr. Gustave
Grenier, as Clerk of the Executive Council.

LATEST NEWS BY CABLE.

LORD SALISBURY DECLINES A
DUKEDOM.

The Anglo-German Agreement to be
Signed To-day—Osman Digna's
Defeat—Affairs of the Buenos
Ayres National Bank—The Cholera
in Valencia.

London, June 30, midnight.

The Rome *Tribuna* states that Osman
Digna led the dervishes who were defeated
by the Italian allies at Keren.

Declined a Dukedom.
It is said Lord Salisbury declines the
honor of a dukedom for his services in
bringing about the Anglo-German agree-
ment.

The Cholera.
The cholera reports for to-day show four
new cases and two deaths in the city of
Valencia, and three new cases and one
death in Gandia.

The Anglo-German Agreement.
The English Ambassador in Berlin has
presented to the German Government a
note with reference to the Anglo-German
agreement. The German Ambassador in
London has presented a similar note to the
English Government. It is expected the
agreement will be signed to-morrow.

The Buenos Ayres National Bank.
Later despatches show the *Times'* advice
regarding the Buenos Ayres National Bank
were inaccurate. The President of the
bank telegraphs that the directors merely
decided to spend the quarterly dividend
until the shareholders' meeting at the end
of the year, and authorizes payment of a
definite dividend. He adds that the bank
wishes to consolidate itself and convert its
share into a safe investment so as to form a
respectable reserve fund.

Cable Notes.
The general act of the anti-slavery con-
ference was signed at Brussels to-day.

Prize Fight and Attempted murder.
Pittsburg, Pa., June 30.—A prize fight
with hard gloves for \$200 a side and gate
receipts began near Shosetown, Pa., 25
miles west of this city, at daybreak this
morning, between Elmer Grant, of Beaver
Falls, and Fred Wise, of New Brighton,
both men of considerable pugilistic repu-
tation. One round was fought, lasting 45
seconds, during which Grant knocked
Wise down seven times, the last time
knocking him insensible. A younger
brother of Wise then jumped into the
ring with an axe and dealt Grant a
terrible blow on the back with the
blunt end. The blow was evidently aimed
at his head. Young Wise then jumped
over the ropes again, and with a revolver
in one hand and the axe in the other, ran
down the hill, defying anyone to follow
him. Grant was stunned for a moment by
the blow, but was not seriously hurt. The
referee decided the fight a draw, much to
the dissatisfaction of Grant's adherents,
and they threatened to mob him, but he
got away safely.

Mangled by the Cars.
Kingston, Ont., June 30.—The driver of
the express going west yesterday morning
reported, on arriving at Kingston, that he
thought he had struck something about a
mile and a half this side of Valanting
station. The section foreman from that
station, with his men, went out to look
and found the body of a man lying on the
track. The head was completely destroyed
and fragments of the skull were found
along the track. The body is that of a
man about 30 or 35 years of age. On his
head was a dark brown coat, with trousers
patched on both knees, gray woolen socks
and brown hat. A two-bladed Rodgers
knife was found in one of the pockets, and
\$2 in bills and \$1.25 in silver on the track.
A brass crucifix was attached to his neck
by a black tape.

Deadly Effects of the Heat at Chicago.
Chicago, Ill., June 30.—The number
deaths from direct cases of sunstroke
causes due to heat is largely in excess
that reported in the papers. At nine o'clock
forty entries of deaths caused by the heat
were made in the coroner's assignment
book. The mercury at noon was over 80°,
but it was announced that a wave, extend-
ing from Texas to Canada, was steadily
sweeping Chicagoward, and when it arrives,
send the mercury close to 70°.

A Fatal Fall.
St. Catharines, Ont., June 30.—Chas.
Hosken, of Niagara, aged 80 years, a
mate of the Industrial Home, was killed
dead on the ground below his wife this
morning. He retired as usual on
this night, and the other inmates
