GONE TO ANNAPOLIS.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Prince Henry and suite, with the President's delegates, left at 9:10 o'clock this morning for Annapolis. The rain was falling in torrents as the train pulled out.

VIOLENT GALE OVER OHIO.

Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 28.—One of the most violent gales experienced in years prevailed throughout Northern Ohio early to-day. At the local weather bureau office the wind, which was from the south-east, registered a velocity of 64 miles an hour. Telephone and telegraph poles and wires were prostrated in many places, with the result that the service is seriously affected.

A TEXAS GUSHER CUT LOOSE.

Beaumont, Texas, Feb. 28.—One of the big six-inch oil gushers being exhibited last night, yesterday afternoon, when it blew out the section of pipe connecting the gate valve, and went wild. It was blowing a solid stream of oil last night, and there will be difficulty in shutting it off. Guards are patrolling to prevent any one taking a light into dangerous proximity of the spray. It is estimated that the well is wasting two thousand barrels of oil an hour.

TELEPHONE VS. TELEGRAPH.

Chicago, Feb. 28.—Officers of the Illinois Central Railway experimented last night with a telephone designed to supplant the telegraph instrument in the transmitting of railway business. The test was made between Chicago and Kankakee, 55 miles of what is said to be the worst line along the road. The telephoning is done over an ordinary telephone wire, and without interrupting the telegraphic messages. The tests lasted an hour, and were declared satisfactory, despite the weather.

IT IS ROSSA'S SON.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 28.—The report that O'Donovan Rossa, the famous Irish patriot, was dying at Colorado Springs from blood poisoning, has been found to be incorrect. The person referred to is not the Irish patriot, but a son who bears his name. All hope for his recovery has been practically abandoned.

U. S. ENTERPRISE IN RUSSIA.

New York, Feb. 28.—A Moscow telegram to the Standard says:—A London despatch to Tribune states that among the colossal schemes which Americans have endeavored to push in Russia is for taking up and reorganizing the traffic of the river Volga.

A REMARKABLE OPERATION.

New York, Feb. 28.—In one of the most remarkable operations known to surgery, the brain of the Rev. William A. Stark, pastor of the Broadway German Methodist Episcopal Church, of this city, has been actually lifted from its bed, and the roots of certain nerves that had caused the clergyman excessive neuralgia, exposed, extracted, and the patient is said to have stood the operation well, and few doubts of his recovery are entertained. The operation was performed by the Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore.

PRINCE HENRY TO BE HONORED BY HARVARD.

New York, Feb. 28.—Prince Henry of Prussia will receive an honorary degree from Harvard on March 6. The name of Prince Henry had been mentioned soon after his arrival in this country in connection with this honor, but there was some doubt as to the plan in the university corporation. This has, however, been overcome, and if the proposed plans are carried out, the degree will be conferred with imposing ceremonies. It is believed that further details as to the gifts of works of art to the university by the German Emperor will be made public at that time. It has been also stated on good authority that the names of the German Emperor and of Prince Henry will be added to the list of honorary members of the New York Yacht Club. This list already includes the names of their royal uncle, King Edward VII., and the Grand Duke Alexis.

GROUNDNUT AT CAPE HENRY.

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 28.—A despatch to the Maritime Exchange from Cape Henry, Va., to-day, says the British steamer Yeoman, from Galveston, for Liverpool, via Newport News, is ashore at the point of Cape Henry.

Philadelphia, Feb. 28.—The Yeoman picked up the Spanish steamship Breza at sea, helpless, with a broken propeller, and towed her into the Delaware Breakwater on Tuesday of this week. After performing this service the captain of the Yeoman found himself short of coal, and he decided to

go to Norfolk to refill his bunkers before proceeding to Liverpool. It was while en route to the former port that his ship grounded at Cape Henry. A dense fog prevailed at the time.

TO ABOLISH RATE-CUTTING.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 28.—The Trans-Missouri Committee of the Western Passenger Association, which has been in session here, adopted an amendment to abolish rate-cutting. It is ironclad, and modeled upon that of the Western Association; in fact, it incorporates that agreement, with an addition covering local conditions. The new features relate only to the lines not members of the Western Passenger Association.

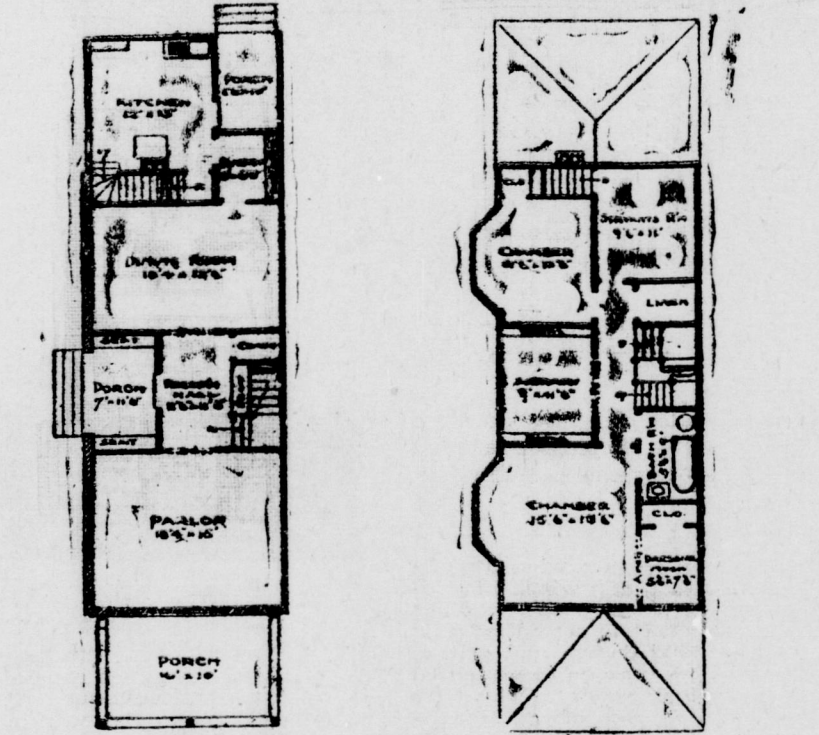

CAPTURED THE ROBBER.

The Mounted Police, After a Ten Weeks' Hunt, Nab William Brophy.

Dawson, Yukon Territory, via Ashcroft, B. C., Feb. 28.—The mounted police at the Stockade Road House, Yukon, captured William Brophy, a notorious robber, after a ten weeks' hunt. During the scuffle while arresting him, a revolver belonging to one of the policemen exploded, the bullet going through Brophy's abdomen and emerging near the spine. The police have spent over \$10,000 in the search for Brophy, and his capture is the most noted since that of Murderer O'Brien.

THE TORONTO BUDGET.

Notes of Interest from the Queen City of Ontario.

Toronto, Feb. 28.—The Private Bills Committee this morning passed the town of Wilmot's bill, including a bonus for the proposed beet sugar factory, and a fixed assessment of \$80,000 for nine years. This assumes the operation of the factory. The building season is now opening up the busiest since the boom. Permits for the first two months of the year total \$310,475, as compared with \$113,000 for the same period last year.

W. B. Russell, chief surveyor of the Telemark Railway, was at the Public Works Department today making a report. He states that fifty miles of the line from North Bay has been finally located, and now ready for construction. There is no serious engineering difficulty in the whole length of the road.

Mr. Justice Street this morning ordered the winding up of the American Tire Co. of this city, on the application of the president, C. W. Sparks, of Ottawa, who has made considerable advance to the company. The liabilities are \$100,000 and the assets \$81,000. Mr. E. R. C. Clarkson is liquidator, and the creditors are chiefly American firms.

The city's bill for the election of the board of control by the citizens at large instead of the selection of the controllers by their colleagues in council, was defeated this morning in the Municipal Committee, the reasons given being that the aldermen were so lukewarm that they had not appeared to support it. A very strong clause was passed giving the police power to suppress lewd posters. Denigration from London, headed by John P. Evans, today urged the Government to grant no licenses for net fishing in the River above Chatham.

Disappointed in love, Frank Jackson, aged 21, coachman in the employ of L. A. Stewart, 41 Woodbine avenue, killed himself last night by inhaling gas. Jackson was left alone in the house, and after sitting a while saving himself, he went to the kitchen, turned on the taps of the gas range and lay down in a comatose condition to die. He was found shortly before midnight, but had been dead for several hours.

INDICTED FOR SMUGGLING.

Barlington, Vt., Feb. 28.—Jos. Gota, a telegraph lineman, was arrested at Newport, Vt., last night, charged with smuggling 110 packages of Canadian furs, valued at \$10,000, into the United States. The United States grand jury reported seven true bills here to-day, among them being indictments against L. J. Johnson and W. M. Dean, both of Alburg, on the charge of complicity in fur-smuggling operations along the Canadian border. Hirst Scavitzky, of New York, and Wm. Bramley, of Montreal, also were indicted on a charge of smuggling diamonds into this country from Canada. Bramley is a prominent business man of Montreal. He maintains that the stones found on him were samples. Scavitzky pleaded guilty to-day, and was sentenced to serve one year in prison at Rutland. The court ordered the confiscation of the diamonds, valued at \$5,000, which were found on him.
