Florida papers say the Island of Dry Tortugas was fired upon by a strange craft bears ing the Confederate flag, and those there were confident that somebody was seriously wounded by a shell. Tre vessel was schooner rigged and painted lead color, with four guns on each broadside, which were all discharged at the distance of two miles from the Island, when the vessel put to sea. The U. S. Revenue Cutter was lying in the harbor at the time, but having no steam up, she was unable to pursue.

Cincinnati, Sept. 21.—The steamer J. R. Gilmore, bound from Cincinnati to the Arkansas river with a valuable cargo of assorted merchandise, struck the wreck of the steamer Courrier two miles below Mound City, Ill., on Wednesday night, and sunk almost immediately. The passengers and crew escaped with their baggage. The Gilmore was valued at \$28,000 and insured for \$12,000. Her cargo was valued at over \$200,000, and was principally insured.

Despatches from Dayton, Ohio, say that at 5 p. m., Wednesday, the canal bank broke at the mouth of Mud river, the water sweeping away frame houses, great piles of lumber and other property. The water rushed through St. Clair, Jefferson and Ludlow streets, submerging the main portions of the town and reaching the first floors. At 12 o'clock on Wednesday night, the greater portion of the city was under water, which in some places was four feet deep. The country in the neighborhood is devastated. The loss is enormous. There is no railroad connection anywhere except via the Little Miami route.
