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CAPITAL NOTES.

Big Batch of Election Appeals Before the Supreme Court—Some Interesting Points.

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—The two remaining Nova Scotia constituencies re-elected Liberals, on Saturday. Kings gives Borden majority.

The Canadian Delegates had no Positive Treaty Making Powers.

General American News—The Trial of Actor Curtis for Murder.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—The Commission considering the situation of commercial reciprocity between the United States and Canada, adjourned this afternoon, without accomplishing any practical result.

The Canadian Commissioners were not empowered to agree to any basis of reciprocal trade relations, and as the United States did not desire to discuss matters with an irresponsible commission, Lord Salisbury was asked on Saturday to confer upon them the power they lacked.

The sudden termination of the negotiations is construed into meaning that the British Government refused to empower the Commission with authority to conclude a reciprocal commercial treaty, and that the negotiation of such a treaty, if continued, will be conducted in London between Hon. Mr. Laurier and Lord Salisbury.

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THE SEALING CONTROVERSY.

American Speculations as to the Outcome of the Negotiations With Lord Salisbury.

It is Not Certain What the British Premier and Minister Lincoln Have Accomplished.

Sir Julian Pauncefote Expects the Arbitration Treaty Will Be Approved by Britain.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16.—No information was vouchsafed at the cabinet meeting to-day, of Lord Salisbury's action upon the treaty forwarded several days ago for his action by Sir Julian Pauncefote, the British minister here, negotiated by himself and Secretary Blaine, by which the controversy between the United States and England, over the Behring Sea question, is to be referred to a board of arbitrators for settlement. At the time of the meeting the result of the conference held in London, during the afternoon between Lord Salisbury and Minister Lincoln, had not been learned, and it was not known, of course, whether or not the English Prime Minister had approved the treaty. Sir Julian expects that he will approve it, and has expressed himself to that effect quite emphatically. Whether or not the British Government will approve the treaty, the action of the Behring Sea agents who have been in session in this city for several days past, will be believed, afford a pretty accurate criterion by which to judge of Lord Salisbury's action. If the sessions of the agents continue, it will be taken to mean by some well informed persons that the proposed treaty meets the Lordship's approval, and will shortly be transmitted to the Senate of the U. S. for its concurrence. Should the agents discontinue their meetings, it will, by the same token, be understood to indicate that the treaty has been rejected by the English officials, which being the case, further meetings of the agents would be useless, as no practical result could be expected. The agents, however, are not yet determined within a day or two.

The ice is about two feet deep, and the roadway of the bridge is about 12 feet from the river.

Captain Moore Speaks in an Interesting Manner of the Mighty Yukon.

Captain William Moore is one of those men whose wonderful endurance and indomitable energy have made them pioneers twice over. Not content with being one of the earliest settlers of the province of B. C., and working hard for several years towards its development and growth, the captain, anxious for new fields to discover and explore, pushed forward into unknown lands for the second time in his life and, though a comparatively elderly man, finished another long and arduous period of pioneering as lately when he started. "Nude as the year 1858 has been in the region surrounding the big Yukon Watershed, at short intervals, and naturally has much to say regarding the wonderful things that exist in that strange western land, where he spent so much of his later life.

Speaking to a *Colonist* reporter last night, Captain Moore said: "Away up there, surrounding the headwaters of the Yukon, two thousand miles from the mouth of that noble river there is a grand and beautiful land, broad, low, and fertile, to all but hardy, strong men, on account of the lack of trails or roads into the region. The difficulties experienced in reaching it are very great, and many but those who are specially fitted to undergo hardships and rough travel should venture there. For many hundreds of miles, I am not exaggerating, where I say that the country is one series of navigable rivers and lakes, picturesque beyond all conception, and for six months of the year easy for travel upon.
